SPRINGFIELD R. I. RED HEN LAYS FREAK EGG

I. M. Francis, of Springfield Route 1, recently exhibited an egg that is an unusual curiosity. It measured 9 1/2 by 7 1/2 inches in circumference, and when broken was found to contain inside the first layer of white another perfect egg of about normal size. It was laid by a yearling Rhode Island Red hen which has a habit of laying unusually large eggs. About a fourth of the time, Mr. Francis says, this hen lays double-yolked eggs and very frequently an egg with a double shell.

Mr. Francis has a flock of 32 Rhode Island Red hens from which he has netted \$2 each since January 1. This flock is the result of six years of careful culling, and Mr. Francis says that in culling lies the secret of success in the poultry business.—Eugene Register.

The man who proposes to wait until we are able to pay as we go for substantial road building, is never ready to begin action.
