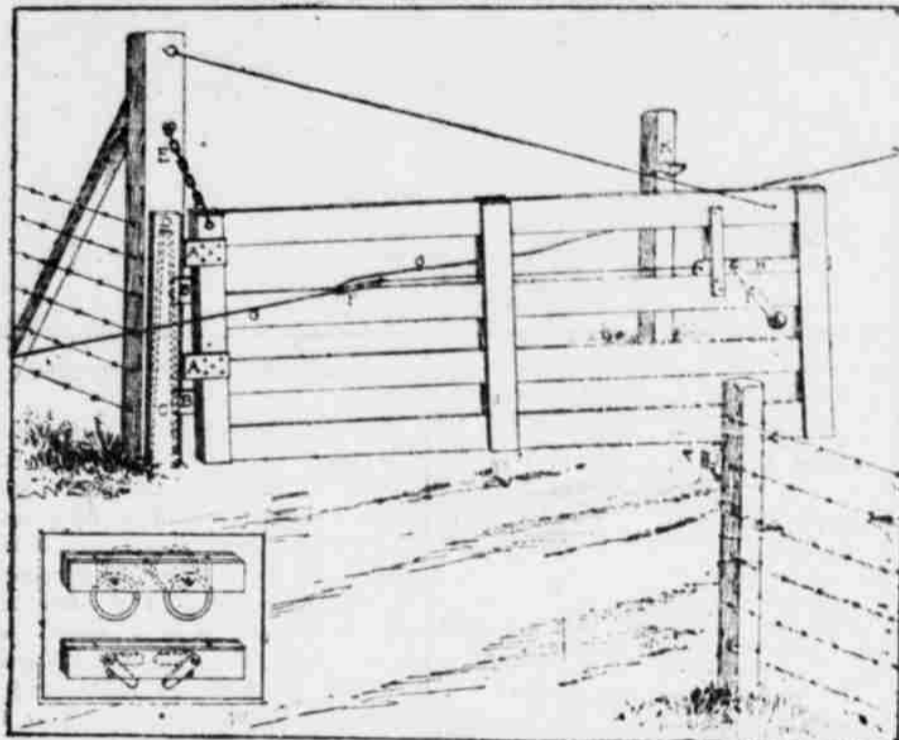

The inventor of the **Pathfinder Gate** bought a farm in Michigan that had "shoulder gates," old slide gates made of oak boards 16 feet in length, that neither woman or child could scarcely open. Is your farm in such a condition, slide gates, sagging hinges, which compel you to get out of your auto or wagon, in your "Sunday togs" and wade through dust or mud to open and shut?

Then turn your gates, by using old ones if you desire, into one of the most practical and easily opened gates in the world; a child has strength enough to open and close it; opens almost as easily as though pivoted.

To renew the old gate, nail or bolt on one end of the gate 4 one inch thick, 4x8 of 6x10 inch boards; A A B B opposite each other. In the cut one is shown to be above the other, so it can be the more easily seen and understood. Nail onto the gate post a scantling, C, a 2x4, 3 feet in length, made wedge shape; over this wedge nail a board, D, the same length of the wedge. This board prevents the gate from being thrown from its hinges, even if stock get behind it, crowding it severely. The gate is hung by wire and chain, making a perfect hinge. The artist pictured a clevis, but this is not necessary; make the boards a little longer and bolt the chain between, and a spike will hold the chain to the gate post; the Wire and Chain Making a Perfect Hinge, and permits the gate to open and close with little or no friction. The long wire that reaches

from the front end of the gate to the gate post can be a barbed wire.

Fasten the rope or wire, G G, to a post 2 or 3 rods back from the gate and close to the road. Pull on the cord and it pulls on the lever, F, which pulls on a wire fastened to latch, H. This pulls the latch out of the catch, J, and the pulling on cord G swings open the gate and the latch catches on the latch K. On passing through the gateway, pull on the cord G, and it froes the gate, and it easily closes, being a gravity gate. The lever F is made of wood 13 inches in length; the short arm 6 in. long. The long arm 12 fastened with a bolt.

Two forms of latches may be made; see cut. The rings, about 2 inch in diameter, may be purchased for 5 cents each. Both ring and lever latches act quickly, catching and holding the gate securely in place.

This gate is patented. There is a fine for making for your own use any patented article.

MARTIN CLARK MAY HAVE THIRD TRIAL

Attorneys for Martin A. Clark who late Saturday night was convicted for the second time of the murder of Charles Taylor, filed notice in court Monday that they would move for a third trial.

The first trial resulted in a verdict of murder in the first degree, but the result of the second trial was modified to a verdict of manslaughter, the jury recommending that leniency be employed in the placing of the sentence. Ten days were allowed by Judge Skipworth for the filing of the motion for a new trial and 60 days for the filing of a bill of exceptions.

The trial of Martin Clark was one of the longest trials for any crime that has ever been held in Lane county. From the time the jury retired Friday night until it returned 22 1/2 hours later large numbers of people waited anxiously for the verdict.

The term leniency as used by the jury is to be interpreted as meaning a penitentiary term of a few years, according to Frank B. Harlow, foreman of the jury. The verdict returned was reached as result of a compromise between the nine who favored manslaughter and the three who held out for acquittal.

INVESTING FOR PROFIT

(Continued from page one)
can be procured in the market that will pay sometimes as high as 600 per cent on the investment. For example, \$50 worth of chemicals will often double the yield of wheat on ten acres. Even a gain of 15 bushels per acre is 150 bushels, and sold for \$2 per bushel—\$300—is 600 per cent.

Mr. Luther Burbank of Santa Rosa, Cal., has produced a wonderful wheat, but we can also do wonderfully. It is well to experiment also. Obtain through the seed house a small package of wheat, oats, corn, etc., and drill in rows across the garden that has been thoroughly manured with chemicalized manure. Drill the corn also, and select the thrifty stalks. Hoe wheat and oats twice; cultivate corn five times. Note the moisture of the ground. Cultivate in the evening. Sow thinly wheat and oats. Call the children's attention to the seedling of the wheat and oats, and finally to the number of kernels of wheat, oats and corn, the manifold growth from one seed. I am going to tell you an almost unbelievable fact, for I could not myself believe it until I recounted it in the presence of others. The number of stools 65; and kernels 964. The soil was very fertile and had been treated with potash obtained from ashes. The season was very favorable. I was never able to duplicate it again. If I could have done so, one bushel would have produced 960 bushels. But this apparent freak in nature caused me to make a careful study of what causes wheat to stool, and I found a chemical that will greatly help wheat to stool. See pamphlet on Home-Made Fertilizer. There is a possibility of a great-

er yield than farmers are now getting. In our previous lessons on the earth-worm we have told you that they will greatly multiply in soils that are rich in humus. As you learn from experience in the garden those experiences can be an aid to developing the farm into a high state of fertility and profit.

Study the great value of the parsnip as feed for milk cows and fattening of cattle. My experience is that it is the best of all roots and is next to corn and oats in fattening, and superior in milk and buttermaking. When fed soon after milking there is found no parsnip flavor in the milk and butter.

I have just begun to tell you about the profits of the garden as an educator, and my allotted space in the newspaper is filled. In our next letter we wish to speak of several great profits to the gardener and farmer that are eminently practicable and profitable to know.
