McKenzie River: Good catches of trout are being made along the lower end, within a few miles of Springfield. In the upper reaches the water is still too high, muddy, and cold for good fishing. Reached by auto from Eugene via Springfield.

Willamette River from Eugene to Oakridge and above: Good catches of trout are being made along the lower sections of the stream and within a few miles of Eugene. Fish are not biting along the upper section of the river, near Oakridge and Reserve. Water is too high, muddy and cold for good fishing. Reached from Eugene by auto.

Oregon Roads

Willamette Highway: Open between Eugene and Oakridge but in poor condition. Closed by snow between Oakridge and Summit. Bad section between Lowell and Reserve; fairly good to Lowell, and fair from Reserve to Oakridge. Never passable for autos from Rigdon to the summit.

McKenzie Highway: Open and in fair condition between Eugene and Blue River. Closed between Blue
