Walter Bailey, former pastor of the Baptist church here, was a visitor here last week. Mr. Bailey is now holding a pastorate at Carlton, Ore.

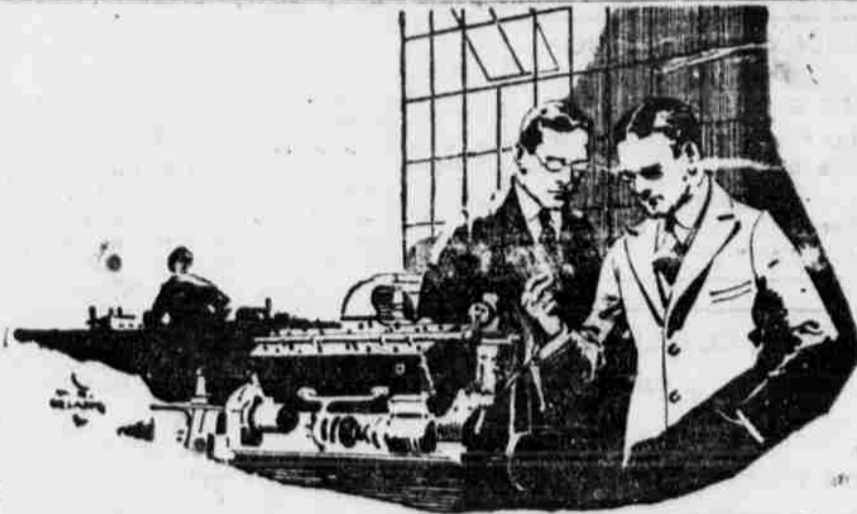
L. A. Tobias and son, Kenneth, were business visitors Friday from Waltherville.

Friends of Mrs. Harry Powers will be glad to learn that she is recovering from a recent operation at the Springfield hospital.



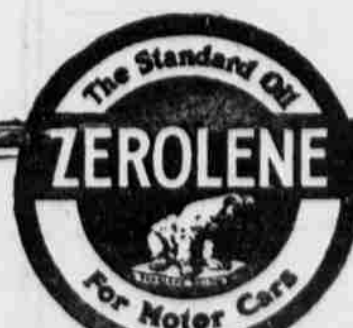
