FARM REMINDERS.

Seasonal Suggestions on Things Often Overlooked, as Seen by the State College.

She is apparently training for double duty later on to lay two eggs daily.

Farm Management-The essentials to consider in constructing a sile are a solid foundation-preferable concrete-walls strong, air tight, smooth and perpendicular and the height should be at least twice the size of the diameter.

Soils-Phosphorus is one of the necessary plant food elements for the growth of all crops. About twothirds of phosphorus taken by the crop goes to the seed. The only way to remedy the increasing shortage is by the purchase of a phosphate fer-
