FARM REMINDERS.

Seasonal Suggestions on Things Often Overlooked, as Seen by the State College.

Poultry—A college bred hen whose commendable effort in making an egg-laying record makes her a figure of some importance, is reported from G. W. Coon, Corvallis. She laid 89 eggs without skip to June 2, and shows no sign of weakening. "Biddy" is an early riser and has her day's work done by 7:30 o'clock. She is apparently training for double duty later on to lay two eggs daily.

Farm Management—The essentials to consider in constructing a silo are a solid foundation—preferable concrete—walls strong, air tight, smooth and perpendicular and the height should be at least twice the size of the diameter.

Soils—Phosphorus is one of the necessary plant food elements for the growth of all crops. About two-thirds of phosphorus taken by the crop goes to the seed. The only way to remedy the increasing shortage is by the purchase of a phosphate fertilizer.

Poultry—Call out the slacker hen by trap-nesting or by physical tests. Non-laying is indicated by the shriveled condition of the comb, wattles, and ear lobes, the closeness of pelvic bones and the contracted or hardened condition of the abdomen.

34 BRANDS MADE IN OREGON

The list of 57 commercial fertilizers that may legally be sold in Oregon this year shows that 34 of them are made in Oregon by three Portland firms. The list as published by the O. A. C. experiment station gives the fertility content of each brand as

guaranteed on the container and as found by analyses of samples bought by the station in the open market. Farmers who aim to make intelligent use of commercial fertilizers get the station bulletin containing the list free of cost.
