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SPRINGFIELD OUGHT TO HAVE A CANNERY
 If Springfield intends to grow and keep pace with the business world

around about her, there ought to be a cannery located here and ready for business by the next fruit season. And there CAN be one here!

There is ample opportunity and field for a cannery in Springfield. All during the harvesting season of the small fruit season thousands of tons of fruit have been hauled through the streets of Springfield daily to the market at Eugene. And this simply because there is no cannery or other market here for the great quantities of fruit that is raised in the several valleys which are tributary to Springfield—yes, not only tributary, but much of it must be taken through our streets to get to Eugene. Nowhere else in all the Willamette valley is there so great an area of fine fruit farms as that surrounding Springfield. We have the good roads. We have the finest location. We have the water power necessary. We have the shipping facilities. It is important to the farmer to save even several miles in hauling his crops to market, both from from the standpoint of the haulage cost and in the saving of the perishable fruit. It is not a question that the farmers would not patronize the nearest cannery or market, providing only that they receive equal prices. It is only a question of cooperation between the business men and the farmers in setting the evidence before some concern in a manner that will convince them there is opportunity here for a cannery. And there are firms that are already interested in Springfield's possibilities. Besides these facts, a cannery is a great home industry. It furnishes a home market for labor. It employs men, women and children at good wages, thus having a double community value. Let's have a cannery in 1921.

BISCUITS, BUNS and ROLLS

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

BISCUIT! What delicate this word suggests. So tender they fairly melt in the mouth, and of such glorious flavor that the appetite is never satisfied. These are the kind of biscuits anyone can make with Royal Baking Powder and these unusual recipes.

Biscuits

2 cups flour
 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 tablespoons shortening
 3/4 cup milk or half milk and half water

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt, add shortening and rub in very lightly; add liquid slowly; roll or pat on floured board to about one inch in thickness (handle as little as possible); cut with biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven 15 to 20 minutes.

Royal Cinnamon Buns

2 1/2 cups flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 2 tablespoons shortening
 1 egg
 1/2 cup water
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 4 tablespoons seeded raisins

Sift 2 tablespoons of measured sugar with flour, salt and baking powder; rub shortening in lightly; add beaten egg to water and add slowly. Roll out 1/2 inch

thick on floured board; brush with melted butter, sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Roll as for jelly roll; cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces; place with cut edges up on well-greased pan; sprinkle with a little sugar and cinnamon. Bake in moderate oven 20 to 25 minutes; remove from pan at once.

Parker House Rolls

4 cups flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 6 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
 2 tablespoons shortening
 1 1/2 cups milk

Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Add melted shortening to milk and add slowly to dry ingredients stirring until smooth. Knead lightly on floured board and roll out 1/2 inch thick. Cut with biscuit cutter. Grease each circle with back of knife one side of center. Butter the small section and fold larger part well over the small. Place one inch apart in greased pan. Allow to stand 15 minutes in warm place. Brush each with melted butter and bake in moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes.
