People's Column

Eugene, Oregon, Oct. 4, 1920.
To the Taxpayers and Citizens, Take Notice:

As this is the third time in the last sixteen years that I have been arrested and bound over to the grand jury, and held in jail for trial in circuit court, on false charges of the cattle men and the kangaroo court of western Lane, whose headquarters are in Mapleton, it will be remembered I was arrested seven years ago for burglary and was brought before N. G. Gude, and was bound over to the circuit court under the sum of \$2,500 bond. For this there was no indictment, but nevertheless the taxpayers dance to the tune of several hundred strong and the savages had soft shelled crabs on toast and a full dinner pail for the time. For this offence they only had ten witnesses, but all returned home happy because their stomachs were filled at the taxpayers' expense. About four years ago there was two men deputized by Joe Morse, of Mapleton, to come to the Eye Opener farm, and arrest Mr. Dole and bring him to Mapleton for trial. I was bound over as usual and sent to the county jail. There was something like twelve witnesses. Three indictments were secured, all for about the same thing, but as a matter of fact all I was really guilty of at the time, was disarming the two deputies and throwing their guns in a pile, as they were handling their guns in a very careless manner, and because I didn't think it was safe for such savages to possess and bear arms. For at least a proportion of the people are far enough advanced in civilization and have six dwellings and a few domestic animals. After giving them some good advice and telling them to handle their guns more carefully in the future, I gave them my gun and told them to go to the pile on the ground and pick up theirs, and I went with them. It will be remembered the comical showing the two deputies made in the circuit court in Eugene, to a jury of twelve

men, trying to explain how I held my gun, and which direction the muzzle of it was pointed. They didn't know whether the sun rose in the east or west as there was so much difference in their two stories on the witness stand as there is between a black cat and a canary bird. For the offence the jury was out 55 minutes and returned a verdict of not guilty for the second time.

These man-eating cannibals returned to their homes in the west with full dinner pails. Who paid the bill? Why, the taxpayers of course. On the 28th of June Joe Morse sent deputy sheriff Gude down to Coquille to bring me to Mapleton before Joe Morse on a charge of forgery. After I was returned to Mapleton, I saw no warrant or heard no complaint read. Just simply taken to jail like a dog to the pound. Now as this is the third time that I have been held here in jail at the county's expense, it is my earnest desire that all the good people of Eugene and law abiding citizens will come to the court house and hear my trial and then form your own opinion whether or not I am a thief or a man. I might add that sixteen years ago the government gave to me and my wife 160 acres of the rich land of western Lane. My place is five miles from the ocean beach in township 16, south of range 11, west of Willamette meridian, and seven miles northeast of the Heceta light house. Remember and bear in mind that this is the last frontier of the far west where there is still good government land to be had. I have located, or caused to be located, the greater part of 25,000 acres of land in the vicinity of my home in the last five years. This has been the bone of contention between the old settlers and myself, as a few were monarchs of all they surveyed of the public domain. The locating of a settler on government land in their midst is as hard for them to bear or as painful as the pulling of a sound tooth without the use of cocaine. After seeing the greater portions of British Columbia, Canada, South America and Mexico, I have decided to spend the rest of my days in western Lane or behind prison bars. Which shall it be? This is for the good people of Lane county to decide.

THE PUBLIC UNMINDFUL.

Unquestionably there is a lamentable lack of understanding of the fundamentals of food production on the part of the average citizen of America, especially those who are city born and city reared. No doubt, there is in the mind of every one a sort of half realization that most food comes from the farm, but comparatively few actually know the processes of food production. Flour and bread, bacon and beef, fruit and vegetables come from the grocery store, the butcher, the city market, the bakery or some such sort of place, and too few people in the city actually think much farther back than

that. Milk comes in bottles and is usually found on the back steps. Not every city housekeeper has an adequate conception of the relation of the dairy farm to her regular daily supply of milk or cream. The farm to many city people is a place to spend a week's vacation, and the farmer and his family are a class of folks different from those that live on the city's checkerboard of lots and blocks. No, farming and farm people are not fully understood by the people in the city, and one of the great problems of the present day is to create a proper understanding of them, and, in reverse order, a proper understanding of city people and city life by country folk. There is no fundamental difference between the people of the city and the people of the country. They are all members of the same big human family, and they are all—except a very small percentage—producers of something. It just happens that the farmers are producing that basic of all necessities, food. Some of the things that are produced in the city could be eliminated and the world move on unchecked. Not so the farmer's product. Eliminate it or reduce it even 25 per cent and havoc is wrought in every walk of life.

There should be no contentions between city and country. Each should understand the other and each grant the other the justice that its relationship to the onward progress of life entitles it to receive. It is no offense to be a consumer of the foods that come from the soil; it is no offense to be a producer of them. Without the consumption there need be no production; without the production there can be no consumption. It is one of the first essentials of our present day that everything possible be done to harmonize the thinking of urban and rural life.—Oregon Farmer.

WEINSTEIN SUES FARMERS EXCHANGE FOR DAMAGES

Alleging that he was ousted from the corporation through coercion and threats, I. Weinstein has begun suit in circuit court here against Simon Director, Sam Director, Nathan Director, Julius Breall and the Farmers Exchange, of Springfield, a corporation, seeking damages in the sum of \$13,500.

Weinstein alleges that he furnished \$5,000 of the \$25,000 capital stock of the Farmers Exchange, which some time ago bought the general store of Cox and Cox at Springfield, but that the other stockholders, who are the defendants in the case, forced him to sell out to them for \$5700. He alleged that one of the members of the corporation even went so far as to point a revolver at him and to threaten his life if he refused to sell.

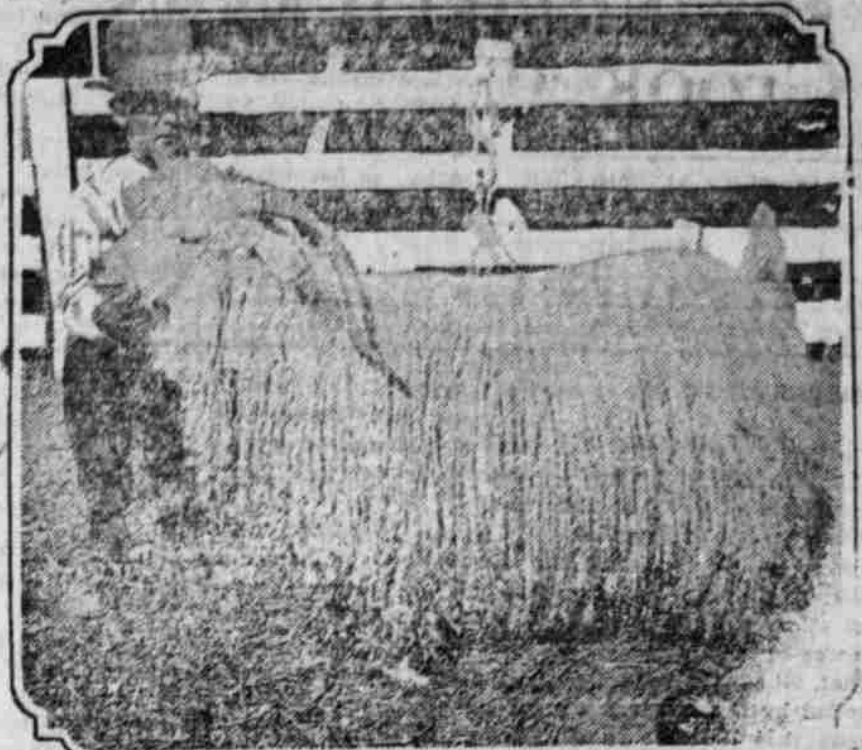
In his complaint Weinstein says that he learned of the Cox and Cox stock of goods which he says was valued at \$41,000 but which could be

purchased for \$23,000 and he and the defendants formed a corporation. He said that each of the others contributed \$4150 toward the stock.

He further alleges that in May of this year Simon Director diverted certain moneys and stock belonging to the corporation to his own use without accounting for it and further, that in order to cheat and defraud him out of his money the defendants conspired to compel him to dispose of his stock to them and to oust him. It is alleged that the defendants prevented him from performing his services in the corporation and that they threatened his life if he would not sell out. He states in his complaint that he sent his son, A. Weinstein, to the store and the defendants accused him of a misdemeanor and had him jailed. The plaintiff says that the defendants at first offered him only \$3000 for his stock but afterward agreed to pay him \$5700.
