### SOUTHERN PACIFIC SUNSET GULF ROUTE REOPENED

After being embargoed since last March, due to labor trouble on the New York piers, the Southern Pacific Steamship company—Morgan Line, has re-established regular sailings every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, from New York to Galveston, with corresponding regular sailings in opposite directions. This means

that the Southern Pacific Railroad company has re-established its Sunset Gulf route between the Pacific coast and the Atlantic Seaboard, and that traffic can now be handled in both directions on pre-war schedule.

The return of this rail-and-water service between the Atlantic seaboard and the Pacific northwest means a great saving in time to the shipping public, as traffic does not have to pass through the congested terminals as does the allrail service.
