LANE'S WEALTH GROWS IN YEAR

The total assessed valuation of Lane county for this year, exclusive of public service corporations, which will be reported upon later, is \$30,673,189, according to a report by Assessor Herbebrt E. Walker.

A growth of \$19,924 over last year is shown for Lane county this year. This does not include the valuation of automobiles which were not assessed this year. Last year the autos were assessed at a value of \$633,955. Deducting this sum from last year's assessment makes the actual increase in property value this year \$673,879 over that of last year.

COUNTY HAD 13 DRAFT EVADERS; STATE HAD 703

Salem, Ore., Oct. 8.—Oregon had a total of 703 men who were officially recorded as draft evaders during the war, according to data received from the war department today by Adjutant General George A. White. Benton, Lincoln and Wheeler were the only counties having no evaders.
