BROWNSVILLE WOOLEN MILLS MAY BE OPERATED AGAIN

Brownsville, Ore., Dec. 22.—New hope for a revived payroll at Brownsville has been afforded by the announcement that J. L. Bowman has re-purchased the old Brownsville Woolen mills and will remodel the buildings. He plans to restore an industry that has been latent for six years. The purchase included over seven acres of ground and the right to one-half of the water from the Calapooia flume. Mr. Bowman has a sheep ranch of his own and is planning soon to have a unique motion picture on the wool industry put out. This would show the sheep in the fields, shearing, cleaning wool, carding, spinning, weaving and finally the fitting of suits in the store of the mills in Portland.
