(Continued from page one) was assistant instructor of household arts in The Dalles high school. D. L. Beals is a brother of Mrs. Frank Withers and Dean Beals, both of Sringfield

Mr. Beals called at The News office and related some of the work being done at Riddle to advertise that town and community and for all Oregon.

The Oregon Growers Cooperative association has a large fruit packing plant at Riddle, through which most of the fruit grown in that section is handled.

Each box that goes out is labeled "Mistland", giving the name of the product and the location from which it comes. This is done by the association.

The Riddle State bank, however, has taken the responsibility of putting inside of each box a circular telling of the nature of that country. the climate, possibilities, etc., and a few recipes for the use of the prune, and asking that the purchaser post this circular.

Mr. Beals says that this method is already bringing results in the number of inquiries that community is receiving. He believes it to be one of the best mediums of advertising Oregon and urges that more of this work be done.

"This section of Oregon produces prunes that are absolutely unexcelled anywhere", is the claim made by Mr. Beals. He says that in the last ten years there has been only one partial failure of that crop in Douglas county, and that this year nearly a million dollars worth of prunes were grown in Douglas county. About \$100,000 worth remain unsold at this
