We suggest that four men, or more

in each ward volunteer; there being four wards that would give us a force of 16 men.

That these men agree to a practical training, drills etc.

That out of these volunteers a chief and assistant chief be elected.

That committees be appointed to draft by-laws etc.

That committees be appointed to attend the city council and lay their plans and by-laws before that body for their approval and support.

That at the chief and assistant get all information possible from the Eugene department.

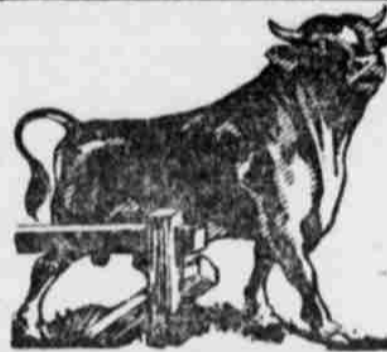

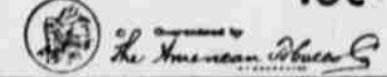
