- Turret captains, first class.
- Quartermasters, general, first, second and third class.
- Quartermasters, signal, chief, first, second and third class.
- Electricians, Radio, chief, first, second and third class.
- Machinists Mates, chief, first and second class.
- Engineers, first and second class.
- Pharmacists Mates, first and second class.

It will be necessary for these men to come to Portland for examination.
