**PIANO; RELIC OF YEARS AGO ON EXHIBIT HERE**

E. E. Lee has on exhibition and for sale a rare combination of machinery for grinding out music; and it is real music, sweet music, not latter-day jazz. To call it a music-box would suggest a little contrivance to be set on a center table. But this is a heavy oak case about eight feet high, three feet wide and two feet deep. The interior is an intricate mass of machinery, which is an interesting study in itself. The front can be easily removed, and all the operations observed. The combination is an orchestra in itself. The main piece represents a piano, strung perpendicularly, operated by perforated steel disks, about 30 inches wide set upright; each disk playing one piece of music. The disks can be raised, lowered and exchanged, automatically, by machinery operated by a motion of the hand. Attachments representing two drums, symbols and orchestra bells accompany the piano, or they can be detached by the movement of a little lever on the outside with the finger. It is a musical wonder. Go and see it. It is owned in Springfield, and has been in a private residence here for several years.
