RECENT LEGISLATURE HELPS VETERANS OF THREE WARS

At the last session of the legislature there was passed a bill granting to soldiers and sailors of the Mexican civil and Indian wars, an exemption of \$1000 from taxation on their homestead, if they have one, or on other property; this exemption also extends to the widow of a soldier or sailor if she remains unmarried.

In order to receive the benefits of this act the soldier or sailor or the widow must make application to the county assessor or to the county court setting forth the description of the property on which he asks for the exemption and other facts necessary to establish his rights to the provisions of the act.

Blanks for this purpose will be ready in a few days and can be had upon application at the office of the county assessor.

Affidavit can be executed before the assessor or any one qualified to administer oath.

In accordance with a decision from the Attorney General this law is in effect and the exemptions will be granted on the 1921 assessment.

SPRINGFIELD HOSPITAL CHANGES MANAGEMENT

The Springfield hospital which has been owned by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Adrian and managed by Mrs. Adrian for several years was sold last week to John T. Baker, of Eugene. Mrs. Rosabelle Tucker, of Eugene, a trained nurse of long experience, has leased the property, and is now in charge of the hospital.
