**NATIONAL PRODUCTS COMPANY ARE PREPARING FOR BUSINESS**

This company took over the plant of the Fisher-Boutin company some time last year. The plant has continued to lie idle until the present time. For several weeks past, the new company has had several men employed putting in some machinery and doing more or less remodeling, to adapt the plant to the lines of work which the new proprietors expect to put out, which will be finished lumber products of various kinds, such as ordinarily turned out by planing mills and box factories. How soon the company will be ready to start up regular business cannot be stated definitely, but not before thirty days.

**FARMS CONSUME HALF LUMBER**

The farmers of the United States consume nearly one-half of the country's annual lumber cut, and any financial assistance looking toward the increased purchasing power of the farmer will be most favorably reflected in the lumber industry.

New business was greater than production by nearly 10,000,000 feet in the lumber industry of the northwest for the week just closed, according to the weekly lumber review of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, but production is still running.

New business amounted to 55,

245,881 feet. Of this amount 32 per cent is to move locally or by cargo. Every northwest citizen should take personal interest in the lumber industry as it is our greatest employer of labor.

This industry is passing through the most critical period of its existence. Its eastern markets have been disrupted by increased freight rates in addition to general stagnation in building activity. Reduced wage schedules have been necessary in conjunction with labor reductions. Taxes, labor or transportation can make or break our lumber industry. Let us work to neutralize these three elements for the benefit of all.

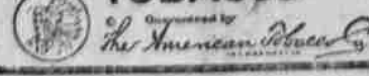
