STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Eugene.—The pavement on the Pacific highway between Walker and Saginaw, a distance of two miles, has just been completed, and the paving crew has been transferred to Divide, at the southern end of the stretch under contract.

Sherwood.—This section of Oregon, lying as it does so close to Portland, is an inviting field for the small farmer, the poultryman and vegetable gardener. More small tracts have changed ownership here within the last six months than for two years past.

Salem.—There were 32.67 per cent fewer men employed in 74 manufacturing plants in Oregon during the period March 15 to May 15, 1921, than during the same period in 1920, according to a survey conducted by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

Salem.—Vick Wilson, logger, of Clifton, Or., and John Cogan, dockman, of Portland, lost their lives in accidents in Oregon industries during the week ending May 26, according to reports filed with the industrial accident commission here. A total of 411 accidents was reported.

McMinnville.—The St. Joe Orchard Co., which owns and operates an 850-acre orchard tract north of this city, is making the initial planting of 500 acres of loganberries to fill the vacancies caused by the freeze of two years ago, which killed many of the peach and cherry trees. Many raspberry plantings are also being made.

Salem.—Reorganization of the Kurtz Canning company by 165 fruit growers and orchardists of Marion county was completed Saturday. F. A. Kurtz, until Monday sole owner of the plant taken over by the co-operative association, will act as manager of the business. With him will be associated a number of men experienced in the canning industry.

Salem.—Practically all of the 275 convicts housed in the Oregon state penitentiary Sunday witnessed the screen production "Behold the Man," which was presented in the prison auditorium under the direction of William Pangle of Portland. At the conclusion of the production the prisoners gave Mr. Pangle and the prison officials a vote of thanks.

Eugene.—A heavy frost Friday night caused damage to the extent of several thousand dollars on Lane county farms. The damage was especially heavy on river bottom lands where tomato vines, beans, potatoes and corn were nipped. Some of the extensive tomato growers said they would be compelled to replant their entire fields and beans would have to be planted again in many sections.

Albany.—The railroad station at Detroit, terminus of the Southern Pacific line which extends eastward from Albany well up into the Cascade mountains, was opened Monday for the summer. Because traffic is light in the winter months no agent has been maintained there. During the summer months Detroit is busy, not only in lumber activity, but in caring for persons on trips and vacations.

Baker.—Organization of the Northwestern Livestock Shipper's Traffic league crystallizes a movement recently begun to perfect a means by which livestock men might deal unitedly with the problem of freight rates on livestock. A circular letter recently sent out brought replies from six hundred representative stockmen, expressing the belief that such a body should be formed, and preliminary organization has been effected.

Baker.—The North Pole quartz mill on Cracker creek, about a mile below the town of Bourne, near here, was completely destroyed by fire Saturday night. The fire is reported to have started from a pile of chips and rubbish on the hill near the mill. The fire was discovered by Tom Dunn, watchman of the property, at about 6 o'clock, and the building was completely burned by midnight.

Brownsville.—The Plainview farm bureau consisting of 22 members, has been organized with C. Cornutt as president and R. L. Bhewster secretary and treasurer. A definite program of work will be followed, according to A. C. Heyman, county agent. William Anderson, head of the project for tuberculosis eradication among cattle, reports the names of owners of 153 head of cattle were secured at the first meeting. These were the names of those dairymen who favor a federal tester.
