THE BRUMFIELD MURDER MYSTERY

Great excitement has prevailed about Roseburg for the past week because of the disappearance of two men and the finding of the mutilated body of one of them. The men were Dr. R. M. Brumfield, a dentist of Roseburg, and Dennis Russell, who lived alone near a farm lately purchased by Brumfield. They were both large men, similar in form, and they were known to be together at or near Russell's cabin, the evening of the supposed murder. Brumfield's car was found where, as is supposed, it had been run over a bank and against a tree, exploding some sticks of dynamite, blowing off the head of one of the men and burning the car. The officers have been proceeding on the theory that Brumfield shot Russell, carried his body to this point and arranged the destruction of the car and the disfiguring of the body by the explosion and the fire. They suppose that Brumfield fled, expecting that Russell's body would be taken for his own and that heavy life insurance which he carried would be paid to his family.

Some days ago it occurred to us that the positions might be reversed, and that Russell might be the murderer. Brumfield's wife and friends are now proceeding on that theory. His wife says that Brumfield probably had \$500 or more on his person that evening.

A family party, consisting of men

and wife and three small children, who live at Roseburg, and had been north and were returning, camped on our auto ground Tuesday evening. They knew Brumfield and his wife well; belonged to the same church, Methodist; said they were both active in the church; both people of high character, as they judge. They think Brumfield incapable of such a crime.

These people also know Capt. Hamlin well, and hold him in high esteem. Capt. Hamlin was well acquainted with Dr. Brumfield, and speaks of him as a man of excellent reputation.

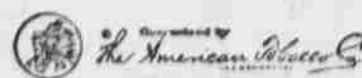
