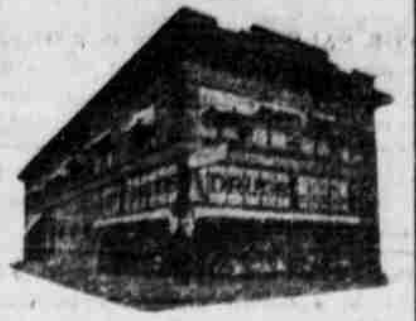
It is not in harmony with our old

## SOME LOGANS DRIED THIS YEAR

A car load of dried loganberries  
from the Sheridan district is being  
processed at the Salem plant of the  
Oregon Growers Cooperative Associa-  
tion. The car contained less than 9  
tons of the dried berries but they re-  
present nearly 50 tons of fresh ones.

More than four-fifths of the weight  
of the fruit is lost in the drying pro-  
cess. The water, only is driven out  
and all of the sugar and other food  
materials remain. When they are  
soaked in water over night they take
