LIVING COSTS ARE CUT

The cost of living for students at O. A. C. has been fixed at \$26.70 for women in campus halls, and about \$30 for the few men who can find room in the men's dormitory. Men in fraternities are expected to cut down the costs of last year, which averaged \$34.18 a month for some 1500 members. Men taking meals at the campus cafeteria can get them for \$6 a week. If two men share a \$10 private room their living will cost \$31 a month each. If they take a \$20 room it will cost each \$36 a month.
