While we are patting ourselves on the back on account of our progress towards disarmament, let us not forget that when the new program is in full force we will still have eighteen battleships heavier than the Oregon.

The late cold snap showed some remarkable variations in temperature in neighboring localities. Thursday, the temperature was reported at 9 below zero at Hood River, The Dalles 7 below, and at White Salmon, on the Washington side not far away. 24 above. At Walla Walla, Washington, it was 3 above; and at Waitsburg, Washington, 21 below. At Yakima, 7 below; and at Seattle, 24 above. It was 16 below at Baker and 22 at La Grande.

**ELECTING A POPE**

Pope Benedict XV died in Rome last Sunday morning, after a reign of about seven years. The process of electing his successor, which will doubtless be described in detail by the daily papers as it goes on will be an interesting study to all who wish to inform themselves on such matters. All students of the high school, and the teachers as well, and young persons who desire to be well informed on current affairs; everyone, in fact, should pay close attention to the newspaper accounts of this election.

None but a cardinal is eligible to the papacy and none but cardinals can vote for a pope. The cardinalate is not an office, but a rank, conferred by the pope, as a king confers a patent of nobility. The pope creates the cardinals, and the cardinals create a new pope. The cardinals, as to office, are mostly archbishops or bishops. Occasionally, a cardinal may hold some other office. For instance, the pope's secretary of state, as in the present case and some former cases, may be a cardinal. The majority of the cardinals have always been Italians.

The ceremonies connected with the funeral of a pope occupy the nine days following his death. On the tenth day the election takes place, or the process begins. That should be next Wednesday. The election of Benedict's predecessor, Pius X, occupied a week or ten days. An election once before occupied six months. The preparations for the election are made

during the days of the funeral. This election must take place in Rome, because the pope died there, as nearly all the popes have done. The gathering of the cardinals and the place where it is held both are called a conclave. The election is by secret ballot. Each cardinal writes the name of the man he wishes to vote for on a ticket. The cardinals meet once a day in the chapel of the conclave building, and deposit their ballots in a receptacle prepared for that purpose. Two cardinals, previously chosen for that purpose, examine the ballots and declare the result. This is continued from day to day until some one receives a two-thirds vote. In the intervals between the votes, the cardinals are secluded from each other and from the outside world in cells prepared for that purpose. Each may be attended by two servants.

One element which has figured or had to be considered in previous elections for the last hundred years or so will be absent from this. The Empire of Austria, for some notable reason rendered to the Roman Catholic church, was granted the power of a veto upon the election of any candidate. When Leo XIII died, his secretary of state, Cardinal Rampolla, a man of French sympathies, was the leading candidate; and the fear of this Austrian veto defeated him, and the election went to an obscure Italian bishop, Cardinal Secci.

The pope when he is elected, selects a new name for himself, usually, in late times, one of the names that have been honored by former popes.
