FARM REMINDERS

One of the immediate benefits of crop rotation is a better control of crop pests. Rotation is an important method advised for the control of nearly every insect or disease attacking field or garden crops, and without it many of the other helpful measures are ineffective.—O. A. C. experiment station.

Late Planting, Less Oats.

Absolute necessity of planting peas and oats or peas and barley early has been shown by experience throughout the state. The earlier they are planted after the season opens up the better. At the Astoria branch station each week's delay in planting meant practically one-half ton loss. In dry districts the loss is even greater. Peas and oats make good silage, hay, or grain, although they are somewhat susceptible to injury by plant lice.—O. A. C. experiment station.

Peach Leaf Curl—Last Call

This is the last call for spraying peach leaf curl. The latter part of February is often too late for 100 per cent results. Apply Bordeaux 6-6-50 at once, being careful to cover every twig and bud. If the spray is well applied while the buds are entirely dormant there need be no loss from this disease. Make it unanimous.—O. A. C. experiment station.
