## PLENTY OF GARAGES AND SERVICE STATIONS

There is one line of business that is certainly well supplied in Springfield and the immediate vicinity; that is the line of automobile supplies. Beginning at the east, in Springfield, we have first the new service station of Wilmot & Innis, at the corner of Fifth and Main. Then half a block down, and across Main street, we have the Springfield Garage, repair shop and service station, between Fourth and Fifth streets. At the corner of Main and Mill streets is the Spencer garage, which combines all of the same features. Across Mill street is Thurman's stable, a combination of garage, livery and feed stable. Back to Second and Main street is Taylor & Ditto's battery service station and necessary and supply shop. South to the race, and we come to Master's Second Avenue garage, with repair shop for automobiles and tractors, and also service station.

Crossing the river to West Springfield and starting at the north on the Pacific highway, we have John Gates' service station in front of the old Collins store, where he has a small stock of goods. Next to this, on the south,

is Mooney's garage and repair shop and service station just going up. At the crossroads, farther south, we come to O. E. Before's grocery and service station. The Hansen tourist camp ground, real estate advertising agency, and so forth, still farther south, is expected to have a gasoline service station and perhaps other features of this line of business.

This makes ten establishments of this class within a radius of half a mile, with Spencer's or Masters' as a center. Most of them keep all or part of the necessary automobile accessories.

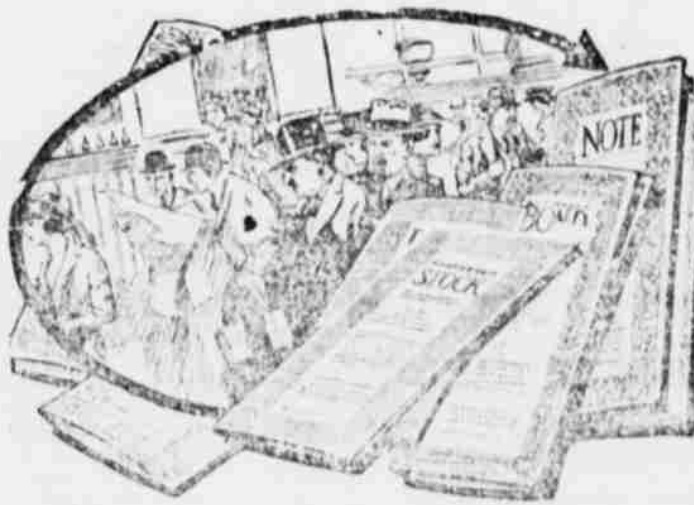
