Editorial from the Morning Oregonian

MR. WILLIAMS for COMMITTEEMAN

Will H. Hays, who but lately retired as chairman of the republican national committee, pays tribute in a telegram to the service performed to the republican party by the committeeman for Oregon, Ralph E. Williams. Mr. Hays should know. His testimony may be accepted as something more than a mere polite and formal expression of approval, to be expected from one member of the organization for another; for it is supported by the entire committee, not many months ago, by unanimous vote of the representatives of 48 states elected Mr. Williams vice-chairman. He is the oldest member in point of service, and it is obvious—it is not denied by anyone—that his standing with the heads of the republican party is very high.

Piston clearances /

4/1000 of an inch when cold
1/1000 of an inch under fire

An automobile engine having a 4" bore will have when cold a clearance between its pistons and cylinders of approximately 4/1000 of an inch. When the same engine has been heated to operating temperature, this clearance will have decreased 75% or to 1/1000 of an inch.

Likewise, a main crankshaft bearing having a clearance of about 1 1/2/1000 of an inch when cold, will show a decrease in this clearance at operating temperature to less than 1/2/1000 of an inch.
