**PRACTICAL WORKINGS OF 4L ORGANIZATION**

Extracts from an address by W. C. Hoegny, executive secretary of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, before the Social Workers' association of Oregon, at a recent meeting:

The successful working of the Four L begins with the permanent conference committee, which is established at each group affiliated with the or-

ganization. The word "conference" itself expresses the philosophy of the movement. This becomes clear when contrasted with the term, "grievance committee," used in older industrial organizations, the word "grievance" conveying the idea of the approach of one side only in making requests or demands, while "conference" denotes two sides meeting in equality to discuss the interests of both. Such is the actual working out of a properly functioning Four L local. Membership of a Four L local con-

sists of the whole personnel of the plant, management, superintendent, foremen, and wage workers of all classes, from the skilled group to the common laborer. The wage workers elect their permanent conference committee by secret ballot, and this committee has access to the management at all times, taking up matters of mutual interest, such as wages, overtime, alleged acts of injustice, on one hand; plant management and operating efficiency on the other hand.

It is with the logging and lumber producing industry of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho, that the Four L is connected. The area is divided into twelve administrative districts, each district having a district board of eight members, four employers and four employees, all elected by secret ballot by their own group. The first elected employe and employer members of these district boards constitute the board of directors which thus has twenty-four members, twelve employers and twelve employees. Should there be any appeals from alleged unsatisfactory settlements or resolutions embodying desired changes, these can be carried from the local to the district board, and from the district board to the board of directors, leaving in all the stages of conciliation the consideration of both sides of the industry in the hands of men who are actually concerned in it.

This, we believe, is the way to industrial peace. This is a method of agreement and removal of misunderstanding which is available in advance of the possibility of trouble. There has been unbroken peace in Four L plants since the inauguration of the institution, and the standards of the organization control 97% of the logging and lumber operations of the Northwest, both inside and outside of its membership.
