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One phase of the railroad controversy should not be overlooked. There was a time when the Union Pacific controlled the operation of both the Southern Pacific and the Central Pacific systems, through the holding of what a famous economist, in discussing this matter, recently called "a dominating minority" of the stock of the two companies. The first step in the "unscrambling" of the old Harriman merger was an order to the Union Pacific to sell this "dominating minority" of this stock. The present attitude of the Union Pacific is that of an attempt to regain control of the Central Pacific part of what it was forced to give up then by government action.

HOOPER ON THE STRIKE

The strike of the railroad shopmen up to this time does not seem to be making any great headway. Some other classes of employees who were expected to strike in sympathy with those who first went out

have held aloof. Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the U. S. railroad labor board, made a statement about the time set for the strike which is in part as follows:

"In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employees. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions, which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop crafts are striking."

"Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal, and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason public sentiment and full government power will pro-

tect the men who remain in their positions and new men who may come in."

This is not the biased statement of an employer or a striker, but of an executive officer of the law, acting under direct authority of congress. This creates a situation which men not already involved, who might be disposed to strike, hesitate to face. Some progress is being made, through legislation, toward putting an end to this ver-active business of striking at the expense of all really productive business. Everyone can help forward this progress by obeying the laws which are made for that purpose, whether they bring him all he wants or not, and continue trying to improve the legislation, where necessary, until it brings the desired results.

HARDING TO STRIKERS

Acting on information that strikers, in a number of cases, had interfered with the movement of mail trains, President Harding, on Tuesday, issued a proclamation, from which we give these points:

"The United States railroad labor board is an agency of the government, created by law, and charged with the duty of adjusting disputes between railroad operators and employees, engaged in interstate commerce."

This board has recently handed down decisions, one affecting the wage of the shop craft employees, the other declaring the contract system of shop craft work with outside agencies to be contrary to the intent of the transportation act—one reducing employees' wages, the other restraining employers. Certain operators have ig-

nored the decision against the contract system.

"Men who choose to accept employment under the terms of the decision have the same indisputable right to work that others have to decline work."

"The peaceful settlement of controversies in accordance with law and due respect for the established agencies of such settlement are essential to the security and well being of our people."

Directs "all persons to refrain from interference with the lawful efforts to maintain interstate transportation and the carrying of the United States mails."

"These activities and the maintained supremacy of the law are the first obligation of the government and all the citizenship of our country." He invites "the cooperation of all public authorities, state and municipal, and the aid of all good citizens to uphold the laws and to preserve the public peace and to facilitate these operations in safety which are essential to life and liberty and the security of property and our common public welfare."

The words "to uphold the laws and to preserve the public peace" are the key to the proclamation.

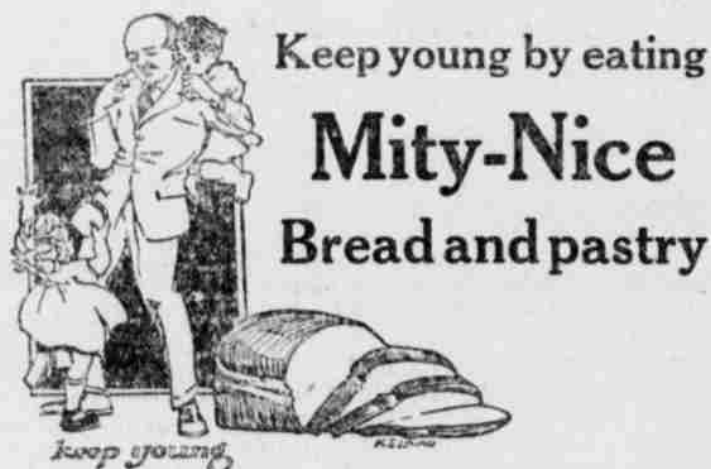
