TERMS AND ADVANTAGES OF POSTAL SAVINGS

From a recent statement issued by Lew Wallace, Jr., director of the U. S. government Savings System, we gather these points regarding the postal savings system:

The United States government has become actively engaged in a great

movement for thrift and saving. It is reaching out for the hoarded and hidden money earned by the thrifty; it offers them a safe investment and a high rate of interest. The postal savings system has been in operation more than twelve years and has been a success. It affords one of the best mediums for people who can save only small amounts at a time. Ten-cent stamps are sold, and when a person has ten stamps they can be exchanged for a \$1 interest-bearing postal savings certificate. Postal savings have proved very popular, many people having purchased the limit of \$2,500.

"The government also offers Treasury Savings Certificates for those who want to invest in larger amounts. They are sold in denominations of \$25, \$100 and \$1,000, at \$20, \$80 and \$800. These certificates are exempt from state and local taxation (except estate and inheritance taxes) and from the normal federal income tax, paying four and one-half per cent interest compounded semi-annually, redeemable in five years. They make a most attractive investment for the person of small means, the wage earner, the farmer, and for the women and children who are striving to save in small lots.

"Postal savings and treasury savings certificates can be obtained at any post office. The post office thus becomes the bank of the small investor. Every person with a little money to save can easily reach a post office, and once the money is in the hands of the government it is absolutely safe. It begins to earn money as soon as a deposit is invested."

In case of need, these Treasury Savings Certificates can be cashed at any time, and the holder will receive the principal and three and one-half per cent interest for the time it has been in the hands of the government. If left to mature (five years), the interest is compounded semi-annually at four and one-half per cent. The amount of the earned interest will then be equal to 5 per cent simple interest for the 5 years, or 25 per cent in addition to the original investment. A \$20 certificate will be worth \$25, an \$80 certificate \$100, and so on.

Postmaster Hamilton will take pleasure in explaining the workings of this system in all its details to any inquirer. It is the duty of postmasters to further the workings of this savings system, as well as all other work of the postoffice department.
