be held on two days preceding the national tournament. In preparation for these contests, a pitching arena has been laid out, comprising 20 pitching courts, 16 for men and 4 for women, with bleachers surrounding them.

There is this to be said for such contests: they involve no appreciable danger to life, limb or health, and there is not much in them to promote ill-tempered strife. But the sharp emulation provoked by these contests on a large scale, and, still more, the expense involved, will tend to commercialize the sport, as has been done with baseball, football, wrestling and some other kinds of contests that were originally regarded as games, and thus lower the tone of the sport and of those who engage in it.

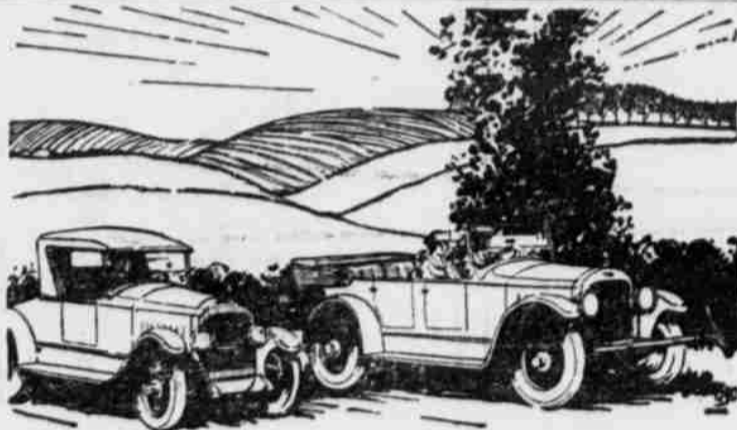
