E. E. Morrison made a trip to Tacoma, occupying a week. He returned last Thursday evening.

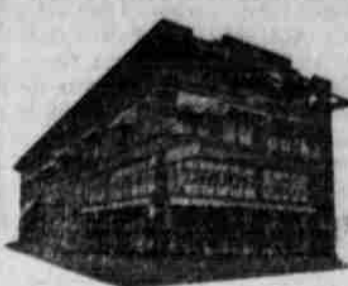
A. E. Graham, who has been living on J. L. Clark's farm, has bought the home of Harry Bush, in Kepner's addition, and will move into it.
