U. S. V. B. REPRESENTATIVE INTERVIEWS EX-SERVICE MEN

War veterans of Springfield took advantage of the recent visit of W. F. Loomis, special contract representative of the United States Veterans' bureau, who spent Wednesday interviewing former service men of this vicinity relative to their disabilities and telling them offers of the government relative to compensation, vocational training, hospitalization and war risk insurance. Mr. Loomis interviewed 15 former service people and of this number one filed a claim for federal compensation, he announced just before his departure.

Veterans who failed to meet the government representative and believe that they have just claims against the government should get in touch with the Portland office of the Veterans' bureau by letter.

Upon leaving this community Mr. Loomis urged every war veteran, who has allowed his government insurance to lapse to have it reinstated immediately.

Project training, or giving the war veteran a start on his own land, a new way of rehabilitation, is proving very popular among former service men

this fall and promises to be one of the most successful means of making injured veterans self-supporting, the government agent stated.

Mr. Loomis announced a new move on the part of the veterans' bureau to dignify vocational courses under the government and help the trainee who has finished his course to secure employment. Diplomas or certificates of graduation will be issued to these disabled veterans who worked so earnestly for two or three years, in many instances, to learn a new vocation, he stated. These certificates will be signed by national and district officials of the bureau and are to be presented to the rehabilitated trainees through branch offices of the government agency. Nearly 1,000 veterans rehabilitated in this district since the war will receive these diplomas as well as those who will complete the various courses in the future. These men are especially trained under government supervision.

There are many rehabilitated men unemployed at the present time and employers are urged to give them first opportunity for new openings.
