"The house has done its duty in every way," argued Graham. "It prepared the income tax bill which has become a law, it passed the best consolidation bill which has been before the session. The senate has amended this so that it is no longer the original bill, and refuses to concur in the report of the conference committee."

Representative Carlin said that leaving the bill die on the table would leave the blame for the failure of consolidation entirely upon the senate, which would not have accepted a sane bill and evidently had purposely amended the house bill in the manner that it had so that the house would not accept the amendments. He gave an idea of what the senate had done by saying that it had removed from the consolidation plans the banking department, the dairy and food department, the state market agent, had taken the highway engineer out twice, had taken out the land settlement commission, the department of labor, department of public welfare, the fish commission, had automatically raised the salaries of two officials from \$3000 to \$5000 and \$6000. The only department left in a workable condition was the department of agriculture.

Blame Placed on Governor

That the governor does not get consolidation is his own fault. He would not stay in one position long enough so that the assembly could get over what he asked for before he had changed his mind. In the closing hours he really prayed that no consolidation would be put over, for he realized that he would be made the goat when it became apparent that consolidation would not save more than a fraction of what it had been advertised that it would save.

It is expected that the governor will veto a number of the bills which were passed in the closing days of the session.

The legislature granted his recommendation for a state market agent; gave him and the state treasurer a place on the certification committee for irrigation district bonds and enacted drastic narcotic and prohibition laws as requested.

The anti-alien land law, another of his recommendations, also passed both houses.
