ASSESSED VALUATION HIGHER

Public utility valuations in Lane county exceed last year by nearly one million dollars, according to the report of the state tax commission to Assessor Ben Keeney. The assessment this year is \$5,250,413 as compared to \$4,259,160 last year.

With the valuation of such property fixed, the total assessed valuation of all property in Lane county this year is \$37,435,113, as compared with \$35,846,014 in 1922, an increase of \$1,589,119.
