Many in Farmers Associations
The government reports that it has received reports from 1400 farmers' associations in this country; that 92 per cent of them are incorporated; that 54 per cent of them pay stock dividends; that 65 per cent pay patronage dividends; that 795 associations reported a total membership of 112,846, an average of 142 members to an association; that 332 associations reporting in 1913 gave the average amount of business done as \$57,159 and 698 associations reporting for 1922 gave the average business done as \$146,734. Steadily the co-operative organizations are increasing in amount of business and in numbers.
