DISTRIBUTE CARLOAD OF EXPLOSIVES IN VALLEY
The carload of Sodato, the new government explosive, made during the war, has been distributed at Corvallis. Sodato is sold at cost to the farmers. This was purchased by the counties at a saving of about \$3500, considering the present market price of other explosives.
The Kiger Island demonstration on December 3rd, by George W. Kabie, Agricultural Engineer at O. A. C., stimulated interest in this powder, and many orders came into the office of C. R. Briggs, county agent at Corvallis. Had it not been for the splendid cooperation of the farmers of these three counties, Mr. Briggs would not have been able to pool this car.
Over one hundred people received this powder, and more might have had their orders come in sufficiently early to get in on the car. A fine opportunity is given to those interested in powder: used for blasting purposes to test Sodato out and determine its value.
Mr. Briggs has decided to open another pool on the powder, as there is still a strong demand for it, and all other pools made in the valley are now closed. However, it is thought that not sufficient orders will be taken to make up a full carload, so he is taking orders now on the basis of \$8.92 per hundred pounds, laid down in Corvallis, at a less than carload freight rate. All orders will have to be re-shipped from Corvallis, as the Dupont people who manufacture this explosive cannot handle small quantities. Soon the season to use this powder will draw to a close, so a carload will not be pooled unless orders come in in sufficient time to allow the Dupont Company to deliver the explosive in Corvallis not later than February 26th.
Persons desiring to purchase Sodato must send in their orders, accompanied by checks, at once, to C. R. Briggs, County Agent, Corvallis, Oregon, in order to pool this car.

STUDENTS ATTEND MEET AT UNIVERSITY OF OREGON
University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 16. — (Special.) — Alice Tomseth, Springfield high school student body president; Audrey McPherson, editor of the high school year book; Pauline Jack, editor of the school paper; Ralph Cline, editor of the school notes; Herbert Horning, manager of publications; Anne Hill, president of the Women's League and Mrs. McLean, secretary of the Women's League; were among the 364 delegates, sent from 80 high schools of the state to attend the annual high school conference held last week-end under the auspices of the Associated Students, the Women's League, and the school of Journalism, of the University of Oregon.
