FARM REMINDERS

The great loss of stone fruits in Oregon last year due to brown rot prompted the experiment station to publish a circular on the subject. This circular was written by H. P. Bars, station plant pathologist, and includes results and information so-

cured from five years of experiment work. The nature of brown rot and related troubles, natural conditions promoting and retarding growth, and rotating growth, and the control measures and material put out on brown rot in Oregon for nearly 15 years. The circular is well illustrated. It is distributed free and may be obtained by writing to the college at Corvallis and requesting experiment station circular number 53.

Peach leaf curl spray of Bordeaux 6-6-50 must be applied before the buds begin to break to to be effective. On early varieties like the Elberta warm weather will bring on rapid expansion of the buds.

Farmers contemplating the use of commercial fertilizers, should determine what ones and amounts they are going to use, and place their orders so the materials will reach them and

be on hand to be applied at the proper time. Owing to the fact that the cattle business is looking up at the present it seems as if the tide were turning for the cattlemen. This might be interpreted by the breeders of purebred cattle that this is a time to raise their bulls as such instead of turning them as steers.
