

Cars Loaded in 1923 Would Make Train 8,600 Miles Long; Would Encircle United States

Western shippers loaded 1,050,905 cars of freight on Southern Pacific's



S. BRYSON. the United States from Portland, Oregon, through Chicago, Buffalo, New York, Washington, New Orleans, Los Angeles, San Francisco and back to Portland, with about 400 miles of cars

The figures gited give some idea of the prosperity and productiveness of the western states, for these cars were loaded in the states of Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico. The size of the imaginary train also gives an idea of the enormous task performed by the Southern Pacific Company in handling this traffic, which was moved quickly and efficiently, without congestion or general car shortage.

Southern Pacific, as one of the leading railroad systems of the country, has had a consistently good record in operating efficiency, extending over a period of years, but despite this fact, Southern Pacific's 1923 performance in heavy car loading, in obtaining a high faily mileage of freight cars, and in keeping locomo-lives and cars in repair, was uniformly better than in previous years.

Campaign Planned

When it became apparent that 1923 would be a year of unusually heavy traffic, the railroads joined in a campaign to speed up transportation. They set definite high standards of operating efficiency as a goal for the individual roads to reach. These standards were: 30 tons of freight per car loaded; 30 miles per car per day;


