ABANDON NEW BORN BABY ON DOORSTEPS

An 8-pound infant girl but 3 hours old was found by Mrs. F. R. Lattin of West Springfield abandoned at her door at 12:30 o'clock this morning. The baby was wrapped in a dirty shirt and delapidated brushed wool sweater of tan coloring. The shirt was white with tan silk stripes. All identification marks and the collars had been torn from the shirt and sweater.

The only clue to the affair was a woman's voice whispering nervously "Hurry up, Alice!" Just outside the house a few moments before Then a car, which Mrs. Lattin believes was a Ford, started up and drove south on the highway. After the sounds of the automobile died away she heard a baby crying. On the doorsteps she found the child.

Deputy Sheriff Van Svererud of Eugene was summoned after Mrs. Lattin spent about a half hour trying to comfort the infant, and he took it to the Springfield hospital.

Hospital attendants stated the girl was not over 3 hours old, and that the delivery had not been aided by a physician. The child will live, it is thought. Baby clothes have been donated by various Springfield persons, and the little one will be kept at the hospital until definite plans can be made for it. Hospital attendants stated this morning.

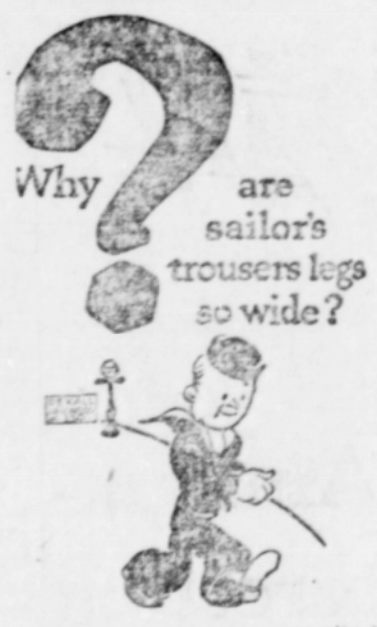

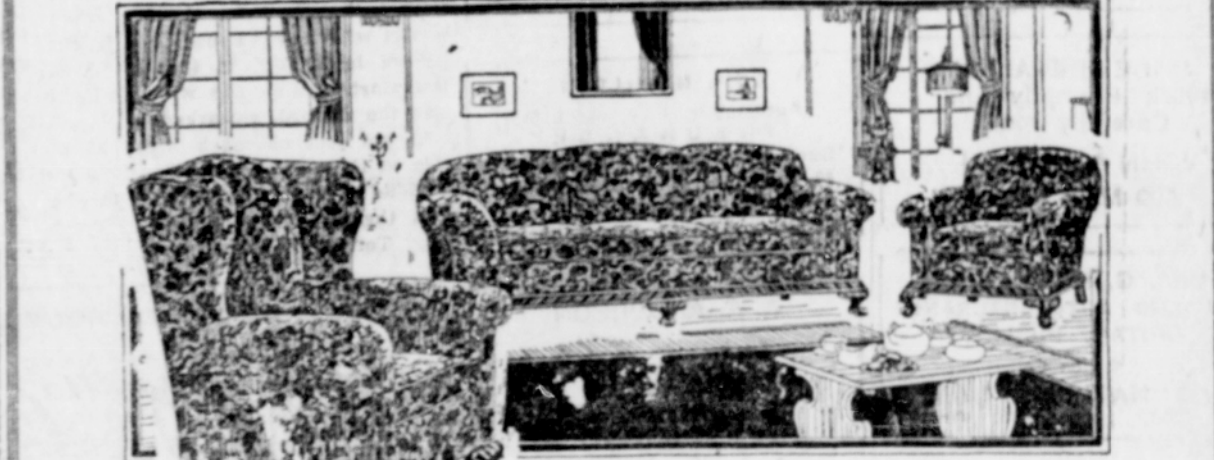
