FARM REMINDERS

Factors that most affect economy of dairy production in Oregon as determined in a recent cost production survey by the state college extension service, are production per cow, amount of feed used, size of herd and the amount of investment.

Crop rotation and use of farm manure or crop residues are first essentials in any permanent plan for most Oregon soils, with occasional liming of soils in the humid section. The fertility of many different soil types is being explored through the system of soil survey and fertility work conducted by the experiment station and federal bureau of soils.

Pigs need good clean water accessible at all times. Water in the feed is the same thing to the pig as water in the trough so long as there is no much in the feed, causing the pig to consume too much water in order to get enough feed. While information is not complete on this subject the Oregon experiment station authorities think that the entire ration for fattening a pig should not contain more than 60 per cent water. Fruit picked while immature wilts more readily than when picked later in the season. Excessive loss of weight results in witting which seriously impairs the appearance of the fruit. "Wilted pears," says the Oregon Agricultural college horticulture department, "lose their gloss, are dull and unattractive and do not become aromatic."

For feeding dry mash to poultry an open box or trough is used by the Oregon experiment station. It is superior to the "self feeding hopper." A box 6 inches deep, 6 inches wide and four feet long make a desirable feeding box. A piece of quarter round material is nailed on the upper side of the inside of the box to keep the birds from hooking the mash out with their beaks.

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Albany schools have more than 135 pupils enrolled in band and orchestra work this year.

Damage estimated at \$9599 was done by a fire which started in the repair shop of the Kaleva Auto company in Astoria.

The Salem lodge of Elks has taken out a permit to erect in the city of Salem a new temple to cost approximately \$175,000.

Cash prizes aggregating \$1200 will be awarded at the Hermiston Dairy and Hog show this year, to be held Wednesday and Thursday.

The receipts at the Eugene post-office for September this year show a gain of 15 per cent over the corresponding period last year.

Timber land in Lane county will be assessed this year 5 per cent higher than last year, according to action of the county board of equalization.

Instruction in a flying school at Oregon agricultural college will start in October under personal supervision of Lieutenant A. R. French of Portland.

A record for September shipments of fruits was made at Hood River this year. Up to October 1 329 carloads of pears and apples had rolled for market.

The attorney-general has asked for an appropriation of \$65,280 for the next two years as against actual expenses for the present biennium of \$45,413.

Building activities in Salem during the first nine months of the year 1924 have exceeded the figures for the entire 12 months of the year 1923 by \$184,448.

Approval of the state income tax and indorsement of the anti-oleomargarine bill were voted at the convention at Eugene of the State Federation of Labor.

It will require approximately \$100,000 to repair the Summer lake irrigation district dam in Lake county according to estimates made by the state engineer.

The number of full time students in the University of Oregon this college year will approximate 2550 or 2900, a record attendance in the life of the institution.

Corvallis and Albany are planning a joint celebration to commemorate the opening of the new Corvallis-Albany highway which will be open for traffic October 17.

The state tax on sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon in August returned to the state \$298,028.53, according to a report issued by Sam A. Kozler, secretary of state.

The Astoria chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution Monday unveiled a bronze tablet, set in a granite marker, commemorative of the first settlement of Astoria.

Work will be started on a new high tension transmission line from the Eugene power plant on the McKenzie river, two miles west of Waltherville to the substation in Eugene.

A special meeting of the state game commission will be held in Eugene October 13. Steps will be taken to take up proposed changes in the game laws with the legislature.

A new tariff containing reduced rates on logs shipped from points on the Valley Siletz railroad to Newberg and Winona was filed in the office of the public service commission at Salem.

Demand for Oregon coyote pelts is increasing. Although the market has not yet opened, 13 fur buyers have applied for permission to submit bids for buying pelts obtained by government hunters.

Fatally injured by being caught between cars while attempting a coupling at Reedsport, Charles Wightman 28, a Southern Pacific brakeman, was married on his death bed in a hospital at North Bend.

While state banks are exempt from the payment of the state income tax dividends paid by these institutions are subject to the levy, according to a legal opinion by I. H. VanWinkle attorney-general.

Following the hazing of Harry Mintz and Jack Spons at Salem, school officials expelled John Drager, Donald Kelly and Vernie Perry, high school students, who were said to be responsible for the affair.

Officials of Lincoln county were restrained by Federal Judge Wolverton from attempting to collect the taxes for 1919 and 1920 on property held by the United States Spruce Production corporation.

A calf, which had survived apparently about three weeks, was found in a well recently by Paul Skimpsey, a farmer, who was inspecting a number of wells on the Dunn ranch south of Lake Malheur.

It will require \$787,110 to conduct affairs of the state game commission during the next biennium, according to an estimate of the proposed expenditures filed in the office of the state budget commission.

A plan to levy a special tax for the construction of new bridges and to repair many old ones in the county will be voted upon at the November election in Lane county, according to an order made by the county court.

The Oregon public service commission has prepared notices of intervention in the grain rate cases brought by the state of Idaho against the Oregon Short Line and Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company.

A diversion dam at the mouth of Hood river has been completed. The structure will divert the flow of Hood river into the Columbia into a single deep channel and open it to chinook salmon and other migratory fish. The dam cost \$587.

Two attempts within a week to wreck the Union Pacific fast mail train, No. 6, by placing obstructions on the track between Hood River and Rooster Rock, were brought to light with the arrest at The Dalles of an itinerant laborer.

The Oregon public service commission has granted authority to the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company to discontinue an auxiliary station at Reith, eastern Oregon, for the receipt and delivery of freight in less than carload lots.

W. C. Snyder, government trapper, shattered all records when he reported a bag of more than 300 since August 1. He works in Harney county under the direction of Stanley G. Jewett of the Portland office of the United States biological survey.

Development of the lumber resources of Lake county is expected as the result of an announcement that the government will offer for sale, probably in the near future, from 200,000,000 to 300,000,000 feet of yellow pine in the Fremont national forest.

One man was probably fatally injured and two others were badly cut and bruised when a Portland Electric Power company's passenger bus, inbound from Oregon City, struck an outbound Oregon Electric train at Hood and Grover streets in Portland.

The Standard Lumber company of Portland, which recently lost its suit to enjoin the state tax commission from enforcing the provisions of the state income tax law, was granted until October 13 to file in the supreme court at Salem a petition for rehearing.

Judge Martin L. Pipes, prominent Portland attorney, was appointed justice of the state supreme court by Governor Pierce to succeed the late Justice John McCourt, who died here a few weeks ago. Judge Pipes will serve under his appointment until January 1.

Maintenance and outlays of the Oregon state tuberculosis hospital during the next biennium will aggregate \$260,851, as against actual expenses for the present biennium of \$185,333, according to a statement filed by the institution officials with the state budget commission.

Oregon pensions have been granted as follows: Herman Deckman, Portland, \$12; William S. Chapman, Portland, \$18; Ralph J. Bailey, Portland, \$18; Sidney A. Ice, Winberry, \$12; Herman L. Gray, Portland, \$18; Altha Webb, La Grande, \$12; William E. Reed, Portland, \$15.

John S. Coke, United States attorney for Oregon for less than two years, sent his resignation to President Coolidge by telegraph and asked that he be relieved at once. Judge Coke is the fourth United States attorney in succession to give up his post before his term had expired.

Enlarging the eastern Oregon state hospital to care for the increasing number of mental patients rather than adding to the Salem institution, which is now crowded almost to capacity, was recommended by Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the hospital at Salem, at a meeting of the state board of control.

J. E. Norton, president of the Coos County Good Roads association, gave notice to the county court that the association probably would start suit to determine the validity of the \$280,000 bond issue which has been questioned because of the law governing the number of special elections that can be held in a current year.

It was reported at Salem that the Dominion Lumber company of Guelph, Canada, has proposed to persons interested in flax development that it establish a linen mill in the Salem vicinity. Install the machinery and take \$50,000 worth of preferred stock, provided sufficient encouragement was forthcoming from residents of the city.

Shipment into Oregon from the state of Texas of cattle, sheep, goats, swine, dressed carcasses, hay, straw and similar products and second-hand bags, is prohibited in a proclamation issued by Governor Pierce. Issuance of the proclamation was made necessary, the executive said, because of the outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in Texas.
