UNION DISLIKES WAY ROAD TO LONDON WAS BUILT

Resolutions condemning methods used by the county officials in contracting the bond project road between Cottage Grove and London Springs and expressing the belief that a good water-bound macadam could have been constructed about \$13,000 cheaper were passed at the last meeting of the Coast Fork local. The resolution charges that the money was wasted on the building of the road.

A protest was made to the county court when the work was first started asking for crushed rock instead of crushed gravel on the road. It is claimed that this protest was ignored and all bids for crushed rock were ignored and one accepted for crushed gravel.
