### OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

#### Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Mrs. Mary L. Mallett of Portland was re-elected state president of the W. C. T. U. at the convention of that body at Corvallis.

Portland was the fourth port of exit for wheat during the month of September, according to a report of the department of agriculture.

One hundred persons, including many visitors from out of the city, attended a home products banquet held by the commercial club at Cove.

Passing the 3000 mark the ninth day of the term, registration figures now show 3005 long term students enrolled at Oregon Agricultural college.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Dewitt Corlies, each 82, and the oldest living married couple in Jackson county, celebrated their 62d wedding anniversary last week.

The recent rains in the Willamette valley have started fall seeding of grain with full force and present indications are that a large crop will be planted.

The number of teachers now employed in the schools of Coos county is 280, or 17 more than were employed at any time during the school year of 1923-1924.

Because of illness, Harry Strickland, 60, killed himself at his home near Marshfield by firing a bullet through his heart. A widow and several grown children survive.

Snow, the first of the season, fell in Bend last week. Heavy snow fell in the mid-Oregon Cascades and it is feared by autolists that the McKenzie pass road is blocked.

Marion county has filed with the public service commission application for permission to establish a grade crossing over the tracks of the Silver Falls railroad near Silverton.

A record for September shipments of fruits was made at Hood River this year. Up to October 1, 329 carloads of pears and apples had left that city for the eastern markets.

Bus lines that will furnish all the facilities of a street railway will soon be in operation at Klamath Falls. A 10 cent fare will be charged and a 20 minute schedule maintained.

Although the season is not yet closed, the Myrtle Creek canning factory so far has paid out \$9000 for labor and \$26,000 to the farmers of that vicinity for fruit and vegetables.

George Rodgers, ex-president of the First National bank at Salem, who was fatally injured in an airplane accident two weeks ago, left an estate valued at approximately \$100,000.

The Jackson county board of equalization last week recommended that a cut be made in tillable farm land valuation of 25 per cent and 33.5 per cent cut on the valuation of stock cattle.

The Gladstone city council has called a special election for January 27, when the matter of the issuance of \$27,000 in municipal bonds for a proposed water district will be decided.

The Oregon spring wheat crop is estimated at 2,415,000 bushels, against 3,982,000 bushels last year, according to the October 1 crop report, issued by F. L. Kent of the department of agriculture.

Oregon's population, outside of Portland, was increased by more than 500 families during September, according to a survey conducted in 35 major districts of the state by the state chamber of commerce.

Increased fire hazard on marsh hay lands of Lake county has brought about the posting of all such lands against hunting and the establishment of fire patrols by owners of large ranch properties.

Voters of Marion county, at the November election, will have an opportunity to approve or reject a measure providing for a tax levy of \$2500 annually to carry on the work of the health association.

Campbell, Archer & Davis and Slack Brothers have purchased large bodies of timber in Lake county and will begin at once the erection of a sawmill on Paisley mountain, between Lakeview and Paisley.

Taxpayers of the Astoria school district will be asked to vote on a \$100,000 bond issue to be used in erection of a junior high school to the east end of the city at a special election to be called November 1.

The Lake county equalization board has boosted the assessments on standing timber in the county from 66 cents to 80 cents a thousand feet. Assessments on sheep are also increased from \$5 to \$6 a head.

Oregon pensions have been granted as follows: Sydney J. Coleman, Ashland, \$20; Louis A. Sorg, Independence, 12; Bertha Mead, Portland, \$20; Frank R. Sterk, Salem, \$12; Guy L. Frasier, Portland, \$12.

Judge George C. Bingham of the Marion and Linn county circuit court, who died in Portland recently, left an estate valued at approximately \$100,000, according to papers filed in the probate court at Salem.

Government hunters during the month of September trapped 673 coyotes, 46 bobcats and four sheep-killing bear, it is reported by Stanley Jewett, in charge of the predatory animal division of the United States biological survey, Oregon office.

Dr. George Parrish, Portland city health officer, who had obtained a month's leave of absence to devote to his campaign as a candidate for mayor, agreed to return to his duties when the health bureau uncovered six cases of infantile paralysis.

River service between Portland and Salem, which will be primarily for the transportation of straw from Willamette valley points to Longview, Wash., probably will be inaugurated within the next few weeks by the Inland Water Transportation company.

According to a proposed plan of the Albany Kiwanis club, several college boys attending Albany college will be "adopted" by the club for the school year and, in accordance with the self-help program of the college, will be kept in work throughout the year by the club.

Damage estimate at about \$90,000 was caused by a fire that destroyed a warehouse and elevator belonging to H. W. Collins at Nollu, a small station about 18 miles west of Pendleton. In addition to the two buildings, the O. W. R. & N. company lost a section house and the small depot building.

There were two fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending October 9, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Milo Shestak, Joseph, laborer, and F. J. Schultz, Knappton, chaser. A total of 605 accidents was reported.

Preliminary steps toward organization of some kind of a centralized agency similar to the prune exchange to standardize the quality and inspection of canned goods and one central brand for advertising purposes were taken at a meeting of 25 representatives of co-operative canneries at Salem.

Fire losses in Oregon, exclusive of Portland, in September aggregated \$667,391.36, according to a report prepared by Will H. Moore, state fire marshal. The most disastrous fire was at Perry, where a sawmill was destroyed with a loss of \$150,000. A total of 125 fires were reported, three of which were of incendiary origin.

F. B. Mitchell, attorney for the federal prohibition law enforcement office at Portland, has been appointed special deputy district attorney of Lane county to prosecute a large number of liquor cases in place of Clyde N. Johnston, district attorney, who is suffering from a fractured skull received when an automobile he was driving went over a grade.

The formation of a night highway patrol in Clackamas county by state and county traffic officers has been completed and the officers will go on the beat riding motorcycles and armed with sawed-off shotguns. Numerous hold-ups, highway banditry and the robbing of small stores and banks throughout the county within the past few weeks have led to the formation of the patrol.

Oregon will be advertised in hundreds of cities throughout the United States next year at the expense of the government. Motion pictures showing scenery, farms and industrial plants along the Redwood and Roosevelt highways were taken last week by the department of agriculture for release to farm agents, officials and highway associations which may desire to show them free of charge.

A deal for the purchase of 40 acres of land five miles east of Pendleton, just north of the Umatilla Indian agency, was closed by the state game commission. The land was purchased from H. W. Collins for \$4000. The game commission plans to make the farm, the third owned by the state, as big as the Eugene farm, which will have a total output of 10,000 Chinese pheasants this year.

Suit for \$300,000 damages was filed in circuit court in Jacksonville against Oswald West, ex-governor, and George Black, members of Governor Pierce's stock and bond investigation commission, by the Hartman Syndicate of Ashland. The suit is the result of a report made public recently by members of the commission, warning the public against purchase of stock in the Hartman Syndicate until further investigation had been made.

Tygh grade, for years dreaded by motorists who traveled over The Dalles highway, is no more. The new grade of the highway, leading down Butler canyon on an easy incline, has been completed and surfaced by the contractor and opened to travel. The connecting link from DuFur to Kingsley has not been completed, however, and the old road is still being used. Work is being rushed and it is expected that this stretch will be done before snow flies.
