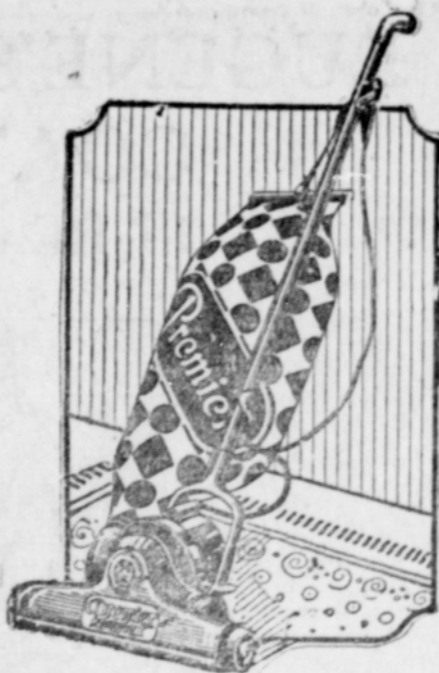

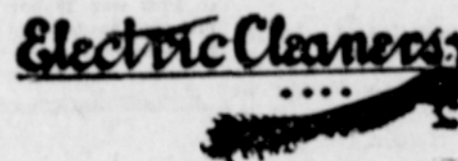

For boarding prisoners in the County Jail, the law permits the Sheriff to charge \$5.00 per week for the first four prisoners and \$4.50 per week for all over four. This is the rate Lane County has paid for years.

In his campaign for the Republican nomination for Sheriff last spring, Sheriff Taylor promised that, if elected, he would only charge the cost of boarding prisoners.

He was appointed Sheriff July first, and has faithfully kept his campaign promises.

At the legal rate the board of the Lane County jail prisoners for September, 1924, would have been \$765.21.

Sheriff's Taylor's bill was only \$398.49.

A saving to the taxpayers of Lane County of \$366.76 for one month.
