VOTE FOR COOLIDGE AND DAWES IN CITY

President's Electors Get 404 Votes; La Follette Runs Ahead of Davis; Medley Two Ahead of Brownell and Taylor Leads Earle.

Springfield voted for Coolidge and Dawes strong at the Tuesday election giving their electors 404 to 297 for the other two candidates. A surprise of the election was the 152 votes for La Follette and 139 for Davis in the four precincts. It was not supposed Davis would run third in the race here.

Springfield's choice for other officers were: McNary for Senator; Hawley for representative, Koser for secretary of state, Kay for treasurer, Belt and Coshov for supreme judge, Van Winkle for attorney general, Ostrander for public service commissioner, Howard, Potter and Wheeler for representatives.

For county officers Hurd led Brady 24 votes in Springfield, Earle was defeated by Taylor 114 votes, Medley beat Brownell by two votes and Keeney lead Jordan two to one.

The tabulated returns appear in other columns.

Two new Marine boilers have been purchased and installed by the Springfield Mill and Grain company, together with fittings, as a complete new outfit to be used in standardizing the process of rolling barley.

The outfit will enable the company to double its capacity for output and considerably improve their product.

A small slide on the Southern Pacific railway tracks near Jasper Tuesday evening resulted in an hour's delay in the schedule of the Oakridge passenger train Wednesday morning. W. McBean, assistant superintendent for the Southern Pacific, with headquarters at Roseburg, went from Eugene to Jasper to oversee the clearing of the tracks.

BUSHMAN NEW MAYOR

G. G. Bushman was elected mayor of Springfield by a nearly four to one vote over councilman W. N. Long in Tuesday election. The vote was 547 to 143 according to unofficial returns collected at the polls. Herbert Cox and L. L. May won out over the other three candidates for councilmen and Linn Lansbery was elected recorder.

The vote for councilmen was Carlton 213; Cox 414; May 285; McLagan 171; and Stewart 248. For recorder Bosserman 104; Lansbery 333; and Smith 235. Hughes received the total vote, 602 for treasurer, with the exception of one or two written in.

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High School Votes Coolidge - Dawes

Straw Election Held by Students; Christmas Vacation Dec. 19 to Jan. 5.

Coolidge carried the Springfield high school vote as well as the nation's, according to a count of the straw election held in the high school November 4. The candidates rated as follows: Coolidge, 98 votes; Davis 36; La Follette, 36; Johns, 1. The idea of putting on an election came as the result of a suggestion from the civics department.

The parties were organized a week before election, with central committees, and excellent speeches were made by the students on the candidates themselves and on the party principles, in the opinion of Vern D. Bain, high school principal.

The school was then divided into six precincts, and on election day the ballots were cast. The members of the civics class constituted the election boards. Faculty members regard the straw election as valuable citizenship training for the students, since it taught them much about the election procedure.

Dates for the Christmas holidays for the Springfield public schools was fixed last evening by a meeting of the board of directors of district 19 at the high school. The vacation for the high school will begin December 19 and end January 5, while the grades will be dismissed from December 24, to January 5.

A new faculty ruling is now in full force that in addition to chaperones provided by the schools there must be two local people as sponsors or patrons for each social function for the students.

An increase of 90 in the number of students enrolled for the month ending October 31 is noted comparing this year's statistics with last year's. Last year there were 539 in regular attendance in the schools, and this year 629, of which 290 are boys and 339 girls.

The percentage of attendance for the month has been rated as follows: 4th grade, Miss Edna Platt, teacher, 99 per cent; 2nd, Mrs. Opal Roberts, 98.8; 6th, Mrs. Ella Lombard, 98.6; 6th, Mr. Halstead, 98.3.

Freshmen, high school, also 98.3; 4th, Miss Ella Hayden, 98.2; 7th, junior high, 97.9; 3rd, Mrs. Crystal Mall, 97.8; 8th, junior high school, also 97.8; 5th, Mrs. Eula Montgomery, 97.6; 5th, Miss Nina Boesen, also 97.6; senior high school, 97.3; sophomore, high school, 97.2; 1st, Mrs. A. J. Morgan, 96.8; 1st Mrs. L. K. Page, 96.7; 2nd, Miss Marjorie Tracy, 96.3; junior, high school, 95.7.

The junior class will hold a party tomorrow night in the high school building. It was postponed from last week.

A football game has been scheduled with Cottage Grove at Cottage Grove for a week from tomorrow, Friday, November 14.

"Welcome home" will be staged at the chamber of commerce rooms. There will be a community sing, and discussion of community work for the benefit of the local schools.
