OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The port of Astoria budget for 1925 has been fixed at \$682,544.

The Silverton Gun club will hold its annual turkey shoot at Silverton Sunday.

James W. Fidler, 78, for 60 years a resident of Oregon, died at his home near Jefferson.

There were 81 persons arrested in Astoria during October and fines collected amounted to \$1595.

Cosco county cheese won first and second honors at the Pacific International Stock Show in Portland.

The Congregational and Presbyterian churches of Corvallis have decided to make an effort toward federation.

The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company has started work at Oregon City on estimates that will exceed \$30,000.

Mrs. Laura D. Harlow, wife of Lou A. Harlow of Troutdale, was elected mayor of that city as a result of the recent election.

The postoffice of Tumalo, Deschutes county, has been discontinued and mail to the district served by it will be sent to Bend.

After being mistaken by officers for a robber, Nellis Zimmerman, Albany high school student, 16, was shot in the head at Albany.

Two hundred and fifty Elks from Portland will be guests of the Albany lodge Saturday at a banquet, program and initiation ceremonies.

Hood River this year has the distinction of being the first county in Oregon to send its election returns to the secretary of state at Salem.

The American Medical association has placed Oregon Agricultural college on its approved list of institutions offering standard pre-medical instruction.

Powdery mildew, a new disease of red clover, has made its appearance in Benton county. It first appeared in Josephine county, where nearly a hundred fields have been ruined.

Reports of a rich gold strike come from Salmon creek, in Baker county. A man named Dickinson exhibited in Baker last week samples of the ore that will assay \$6000 to the ton.

A successor to John S. Coke, United States district attorney, with headquarters in Portland, probably will not be appointed until after January 1, according to Senator McNary.

Roy Sandstrom, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Axel Sandstrom, of Bandon, was killed instantly when he came in contact with an electric wire which was hanging from a pole.

The city of Klamath Falls authorized a \$50,000 bond issue for the building of a public library and public women's rest room by a vote of 1622 to 1141 at the election last week.

Albert Wilton was killed instantly at the Culp creek camp near Cottage Grove of the Anderson & Middleton Lumber company when caught between a log and a stump and crushed.

Changes in the state game laws making open seasons uniform throughout the state, were recommended in a meeting of the Umatilla County Fish and Game Protective association at Pendleton.

Fred Parazoo, who recently shot and killed his stopfather, James Snider, trapper and hunter, residing at Peel, was indicted by the grand jury at Roseburg on a charge of murder in the second degree.

Approximately \$2,275,000 of second half state taxes have been received at the state treasury department. About \$390,000 is outstanding. Out of 36 counties in the state only six have not completed their payments.

In the absence of other employes a robber entered the Multnomah Commercial & Savings bank at Multnomah station, near Portland, forced the teller into the vault and escaped with \$1720.45 in cash and \$6060 in bonds.

Total resources of the Oregon banks at the close of business on October 10 were \$350,743,458.12, as against \$318,991,712.97 on June 30, according to a statement issued at Salem by Frank Bramwell, state superintendent of banks.

Colonel J. J. Harbaugh, 78-year-old Lane county juvenile officer, was seriously injured when a Southern Pacific freight engine struck his automobile at the Spore's crossing on the Mohawk branch 10 miles northeast of Eugene.

J. L. Schnavelly and N. E. Benyon, engineer and fireman on a steam shovel belonging to the J. F. Shea company, are thought to have been killed when the shovel was carried across the road and 50 feet of level ground down an embankment of 75 feet, and plunged into the Bull Run river.

A bond issue of \$500,000 for the completion of the Baker-Unity and Baker-Cornucopia roads which was submitted to the voters of Baker county received on unofficial returns 3054 votes in favor and 1905 against the proposal.

The state tax on gasoline and distillate sales for September, 1924, aggregated \$277,172.96, according to a statement prepared by the secretary of state. The tax was based on 8,998,510 gallons of gasoline and 286,705 gallons of distillate.

The state land board has no legal authority to loan irreducible school funds of the state on a water ditch, according to a legal opinion handed down by the attorney-general. The opinion was requested by an irrigation district in eastern Oregon.

Thirty assessors of the 36 in the state attended the annual convention of the Oregon County Assessors' association in Portland last week, heard addresses, re-elected their old officers and selected Dallas as the meeting place for the next convention.

The Cottage Grove cannery distributed more than \$14,000 during the 1924 season, largely in the packing of products that otherwise would have been a waste. The amount paid for produce was \$6,594.76 and \$7815.29 was paid for labor, cans and boxes.

In an effort to check goiter among the children of the Lincoln school of Eugene the health clinic operated by the Lincoln Parent-Teacher association has started a weekly distribution of iodine tablets among the children of the third grade and upwards.

Oregon pensions have been granted as follows: Willis Snook, Portland, \$15; Carl Ritterspacher, Portland, \$12; Edith M. Gill, Klamath Falls, \$20; Sanny B. Vesey, Portland, \$18; minors of Frank E. Coquillette, Independence, \$20; Christopher C. Marsh, Myrtle Creek, \$18.

By a vote of 3611 to 1384 Klamath county voters approved a special \$125,000 road bond issue for completion of The Dalles-California highway to the Deschutes county line and also completion of the west shore highway extending about 50 miles around upper Klamath lake.

Following a violent storm last week, a large buck deer sauntered into the city of Lakeview, wandered down Main street past the courthouse, turned one of the principal business thoroughfares and walked out of town through alleys and the back yards of residents of the city.

Edward Holk, 48, was killed instantly and Joe Smitel seriously injured at Astoria, when a slingload of lumber being hoisted from the Hammond Lumber company schooner Trinidad at the port dock broke from its fastening and crashed down on a crew of longshoremen.

Complete returns from all precincts show that George L. Baker was elected mayor of Portland on a plurality of 16,833 votes; that John M. Mann had been elected commissioner on his 53,515 first choice votes, and A. L. Barbur on a plurality of 12,553 on all three choices as the result of the city election last week.

The board of directors of the Ana river irrigation project at the north end of Superior lake have requested Rhea Luper, state engineer, to make an investigation of the possibility of the development of the land in the dry bed of Silver lake by a system of deep wells and electric power to be developed at the irrigation dam.

Edward H. Edmundson of Salem has received highest honors at the Annapolis naval academy, according to a letter received in Salem. He is a son of Mrs. Alice E. Edmundson. His recent award makes him a "five-striper," the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a naval cadet, and an honor granted to only one man.

Shipments of broccoli from Douglas county jumped from 175 carloads in 1923 to 400 in 1924, according to Foster Butler, manager of the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange. Mr. Butler said that this year an even greater acreage had been planted but that due to the dry summer the crop to be harvested this winter probably would be about the same as the 1924 crop.

There were four fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending November 6, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were: Lloyd W. Lyons, Walton, donkey engineer; William Handa, Portland, bucker; William F. Bugh, Camas Valley, laborer, and Basil Albert Wilton, Vals, wood buckler. A total of 539 accidents were reported during the week.

Goose hunting on the upper Columbia river is good now and hunters report securing limit bags in the vicinity of Blalock and Arlington, according to announcement of Captain A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden. He said goose hunting would be good for the next two months on the bluffs along the Columbia river and in the wheat fields. Sportsmen are warned that the territory along the Columbia river for a distance of a quarter of a mile inland on each side is a game refuge.
