Ralph Taylor visited his brother, Charles Taylor last Tuesday.

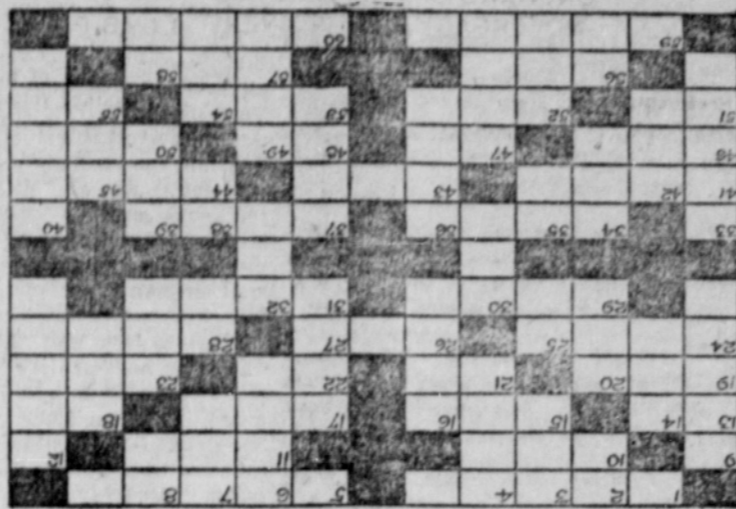
There was a shower given at the home of Lee Davis Thursday afternoon in honor of Miss Etta Davis, bride elect.

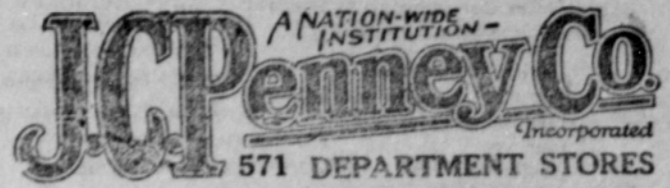
