

OFFICER ASKS HELP IN CURBING DISEASES

Co-operation in health preservation is asked by Dr. W. H. Pollard, health officer, by reporting any communicable diseases at once. The following more common diseases which come under this category, should be reported within twenty-four hours: meningitis, chancroid, chickenpox, erysipelas, mumps, pneumonia, infantile paralysis, scabies, scarlet fever, septic sore throat, small pox, syphilis, tuberculosis, typhoid fever and whooping cough.

The above are mentioned under section 8 of the rules of the state board of health, to be reported.

Anyone having the care of such a patient, either a member of the household, the proprietor of a hotel or lodging house, a nurse or physician, members of hospital staffs, heads of schools and teachers should report such cases, and assistance in this respect is asked by Dr. Pollard.
