### ORDINANCE NO. 481 WAS AMENDED AT A SPECIAL MEETING HELD MARCH 23rd, 1925 TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

#### ORDINANCE NO. 481, SECTION ONE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, to Park any Motor Vehicle or Motor Truck, on any street within the town of Springfield, unless said Motor Vehicle or Motor Truck keeps burning both its head light and its tail light, during the period of such parking. Provided, However, that this restriction shall apply only to the period intervening between dusk and day-break. Provided, Further, that this shall not apply to parking on Main Street, nor the intersections on each side of Main Street at Fourth Street and Fifth street to the center of the block.

Passed by the Common Council this 23rd day of March, 1925, by the following vote:

### BLUE GRASS AND RED TOP ARE BEST LAWN MIXTURES

The lawn mixture giving best results in the Willamette valley is Kentucky blue grass 50 per cent, and red top 50 per cent. This is sown at the rate of one pound to 300 square feet. Clover is not recommended because it bruises, grows unevenly, is difficult to mow, and has a yellow spotted appearance right after mowing. A fur-

ther disadvantage is that it prevents effective spraying to kill most infestations. The spray kills the clover with the moss, but does not injure the narrow blades of the grass. A himeograph on the treatment of moss in lawns may be had by writing to the experiment station.

### FARM REMINDERS

Thorough cleaning of seed wheat, seed oats, or seed barley to get rid of

wild oats and other weed seed gives a cleaner and better Oregon crop more bushels to the acre and less dockage when the grain is sold, the experiment station points out.

That general uprose Oregon hens should be mated one male to 15 hens and leghorns or egg types mated one male to 20 hens is recommended by the experiment station. These figures

are about right for individual matings, but if a large flock is to be mated, the number of hens to one male bird may be increased 20 per cent.

For early Oregon potatoes, while the ground is still cold, the planting of whole seed is the best practice, reports the experiment station. Such seed does not rot if the germination is slow.

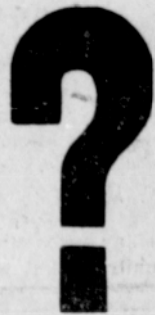
