NOTICE TO REGISTERED VOTERS The County Clerk's Office has completed checking by precincts, the names of registered voters who have failed to vote in the precinct during the years 1923 and 1924. Postal card notices have been mailed to such voters calling attention to their failure to vote in the said period and asking them to reinstate their registration if desired, and that otherwise their registration will be cancelled. In many cases the person notified may be regularly voting in some precinct in the county other than the one referred to in the notice, and in such case will be continued in the precinct where voting, but dropped in the old precinct. The address on the postal card will usually indicate the precinct where cancellation is to be made. Where any doubt exists in the mind of the voter as to his proper registration, it will be well to check up at the clerks' office. Dear Miss Flo-- I have many times read of the wife who fails to keep pace with her husband or the man who has lost step with a progressive wife, but our case apparently is one in which both of us have lost interest in everything, including each other. After the high cost of potatoes is considered, or how the neighbors new car appears, or yet again how my husband talked up to the boss, we have exhausted all topics of conversation, and complete silence--or arguments--results.

We have no common interests. Knowing that I detest music unless it happens to be jazz--my husband invariably suggests an opera--when I want to go to a movie. I refuse to go to the opera--he refuses to go to the movies. He even refuses to go out dancing in the evening--saying that he works hard all day and can't stay up all hours of the night dancing. He doesn't like my friends and I don't like his. Consequently, we neither of us have many friends. We become more intolerant every day, and our marriage seems to be nothing more than an ordinary endurance contest. We live in a fairly good sized town, are in moderate circumstances, but unfortunately, we have no children. We have thought of adopting a youngster, but we both feel that we would be taking too much of a chance--not knowing how the child would turn out.

What would you advise? Nora.

Nora--you are selfish--and so is your husband. Neither of you have learned the meaning of consideration, and until you do, you will never be happy together. Has it ever occurred to you that your husband is working to support you, and that no doubt he is tired when he comes home in the evening? Neither does he realize that, because you are in the house all day, busy with the problems of a housewife, you want to go out in the evening.

The only solution in that case is for each to unbind a little. Why not make an arrangement that when you go dancing, you return at a certain hour? The same plan may be applied to the music. If, when he asks you to go to the opera, he selects something particularly light and entertaining, you may find yourself enjoying it.

Discuss it with him--perhaps you may be able to come to some agreement. The strongest bond, the interest which always is greatest, is unfortunately denied you. Children would unquestionably furnish the mutual interest which you seem to lack. Because of this very lack of a great bond, you both should make every effort to replace it with other common interests. Neither of you are companionable enough. You need new contacts. Every one needs a variety of interests--and especially is this true of childless couples.

Friends are necessary--not a great number, but those who are stimulating in their ideas, active mentally, and what is even more important, intelligent. A good show now and then, some music, a lecture thrown in, good books, movies, radio, activity in community affairs afford the husband and wife mutual interests. In your case a child would save everything. In living to make the child happy, you would both forget yourself.

Perhaps you do take a chance when you adopt a child. However, it is always possible to secure all the facts surrounding the child's birth. For that matter, parents are never quite sure how their own children will turn out, and it is a chance every one with children must take. With proper training, proper environment and love, the average child will in most cases reveal into just the sort of a person you want it to be, in spite of any unfavorable qualities the child may have inherited from its parents and long line of ancestors.

Orchards of Oregon stone fruits that are subject to brown rot should be protected against early infection originating from the spore cups developed by the old mummies in the ground, says the experiment station. Continuously harrowing the orchard soil throughout the blossom period when these cups are developing will destroy them and thus prevent spore discharges.
