Building permits during March totaled \$185,430 in Eugene.

The First National bank of Bandon was closed for voluntary liquidation.

The state land department in March turned over to the state treasurer \$120,128,34.

The state irrigation securities commission has extended for a period of six months state guarantee of interest on \$550,000 of bonds issued by the Tumalo irrigation district.

The Eugene chamber of commerce has appointed a committee to investigate flax-growing conditions in the Willamette valley and to act in confunction with a valley committee.

Poultry production will be greatly increased in the Pilot Rock district this year, it is reported. Indications are that 10 or 12 carloads of chickens and turkeys will be shipped this year.

The Home Telephone & Telegraph company, with headquarters in Medford, filed application with the public service commission for permission to increase its rates on an average of 25

The tax levy for 1925, based on the valuations of all assessable property in Oregon for 1924, aggregates \$42,660.338.65, according to a statement by Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner.

Hines, director of the veterans' bureau, will immediately order an engineer of the bureau to go to Portland from southern California and make an examination of the proposed hospital site.

Practically all of the principal railroads of Oregon and Washington and the Gilmore & Pittsburg and the Pacific & Idaho Northern were made defendants in a proceeding brought before the interstate commerce commission by the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon, the Northwestern Livestock Shippers' league and the Portland Livestock exchange.
