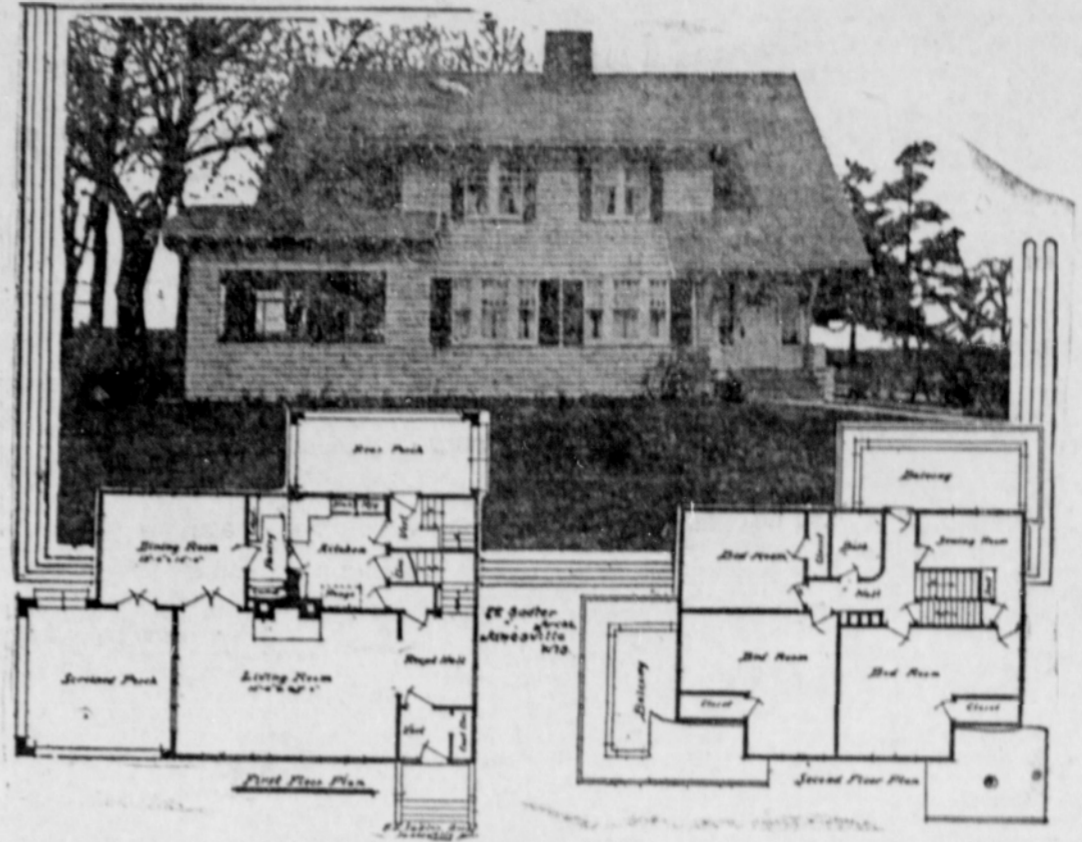
New Repair Shop Opens
